A deplorable lack of direct purpose, and not less lamentable ignorance of what legislation would con duce to the interest of agriculture, are the two besetting misfortunes of the farmer. A determined purpose to form associationand discuss their grievances would ere long point a way to remedy the evils which have been the subject of chronic complaint of the farming interest, from time immemo rial. A higher education, a concert of action and unity of purpose would soon bring about an intelligent understanding of their case and the present the means, as far as legislative means could apply a remedy, for the manifold evil, which the farmer suffers, or alleges he suffers from laws which unjustly discriminate agains agriculture, and in favor of railroad monopclies and middle men which he charges are his constant extortioners. Their numbers are certainly large enough to control legis lation as they might dertermine, if unitedly and intelligently directed. Grumbling with their business, and against the rest of man kind will certainly never cure their grievances.
