Chart-Pictures of the Census.

To the thoughtful mind, the decennial census of the United States is one of the most interesting of documents. The first volume of the ninth census, just issued by the Superintendent, containing "Statistics of Population," is peculiarly so, from the fact of its containing maps, representing, in the most striking manner to the eye, the density of population, nationality, wealth, education, and other circumstances connected with our resources.

We take first the chart-picture of the density of population. The darkest portions are those districts containing over 125 inhabitants to the square mile. The next lighter shade represents those from 75 to 125 to the square mile, and so on until we reach a perfect white, indicating a proportion less than five. The chart shows a dark stream of population coursing down the Atlantic coast, from the northern boundary of Massachusetts to the lower edge of New Jersey. The darkest colors are seen to be in Eastern Massachusetts, in Western Connecticut, Southern New York, Middle New Jersey, and Eastern Pennsylvania. 
