Preparation of Shad.—The Harboring Patriot, says: "The efforts of the recently appointed fish commissioners will be confined this summer to the propagation of the shad in the Susquehanna. Several million larger springs will be scattered in a view to ascertain the extent of their flora and to the selection of the more desirable ones for hatching house purposes. One hundred sufficient quantities to propagate 10,000,000 shad are to be distributed in various portions of the river. The present intention is to place a shad hatching box above the Columbia dam and a number farther down the stream. The first of these boxes will be erected under the supervision of Seth Green, the celebrated pisciculturist."

Clean Up.—During the winter season there invariably collects around the premises of even the most particular housekeepers a lot of rubbish and garbage, which, with the approach of Spring, should be at once removed. Aside from the mere measure of cleanliness, this matter should receive attention more particularly as a matter of health, for there is no fact better established than that filth and dirt around a dwelling is one of the most frequent causes of sickness and disease. There are persons, however, who, notwithstanding they feel this to be true, yet through carelessness or some other feeling, allow filth of all kinds to accumulate around their premises, and never think of removing it until they are so compelled by their neighbors, who are suffering, or by the enforcement of those laws relative to the matter, which have been enacted by the authorities of every properly governed municipality. Should property holders desire to clean up their premises, the authorities should have the matter attended to for them.

Capture of Horse Thief.—Sheriff Thomas and deputy White, were returning from a sale in Bassara Neck, on Monday, when they passed G. W. Denny's, ex-sheriff, Mr. Denny was about hitching a horse to a carriage. The sheriff stopped Mr. Denny told them that he was about to tell a horse which a colored man was about to tell to him. The sheriff inquired of the owner of the horse the price and he answered \$75. The horse being evidently worth a great deal more money, the sheriff suspected it had been stolen and took both horse and negro in charge. After lodging the negro in jail, he confessed that he had stolen the horse, the Sunday night previous, and that the animal belonged to Mr. Milton Steel, residing at Nermald, Mill Creek Hundred, New Castle county, Delaware. The horse was returned to the owner of the horse and the thief was released.

Mr. Steel, on receiving information of his horse, came to Elkton, paid Sheriff Thomas \$50, his share of the offered reward and read the same to the jury. The thief then informed the two gentlemen that he had the horse and thief both safe at Elkton.

On the conviction of the thief, which seems certain, the Detective Company will pay the balance of the reward—\$150.

The next morning Sheriff Thomas started in search of the owner of the horse, by whom he was to be returned. The horse was found in the hands of a man named James H. Porter, who was a well known gambler and a notorious thief. After a comparison of notes the strangers handed the sheriff a check for \$200, which was the reward for the recovery of the horse—\$50 by the owner, and \$150 by the Southern Union Association. The check was cashed at the bank and the reward was paid to the owner.
