Among the Jews, and down even later than our English translation of the scriptures, the word only meant interest. Since then, however, it has assumed a bad sense, and implies exorbitant rates of interest-an illegal interest. All interest among the Jews was accounted usurious and it was considered a great wrong to exact interest from a brother Jow; but they were allowed to lend to the stranger and exact interest or usury on the loan. The Jews were anciently an agricultural and pastoral people, among whom the science of money was not brought to that perfection which it has attained, since they have become entirely a commercial people. The influence of former opinions on the subject still retains some hold on our agricultural classes, but has long ago been discarded by purely commercial peoples.

Nearly all christian nations have fixed by law rates of interest, and these laws still remain on the statute books, but are virtually a dead letter; and the opinion that money is a merchantable commodity, subject to be bought and sold at any price agreed upon between the buyer and seller, or borrower and lender, has gained ground in our time everywhere.

Extortionate rates for money (as high prices for any thing) are a standing subject of complaint on the part of the borrower at the present time, who finds himself una-ble to pay back the loan he has contracted. In nine cases out of ten where failures loan, even had he got it on the ancient Jewish principle. Numbers of our farmers, as well as other business men, find themselves at the present time, unable to pay their loans, and blame their misfortune altogether on the usurious rates of interest which they have assumed to pay. This doubtless, in some cases, helps to wind up those who go under the auctioneer's hammer; but, could the same parties, who ascribe all their woes to twelve per cent, survive, if the rate paid was six per cent? The inevitable disaster might be postponed a little while perhaps, but would come at last. It is bad for farmers to borrow moncy in these times of extravagance. They had better economize in every conceivable way, or sell part of their land and judiciously use the capital thus acquired to enrich the balance. Plowing too much poor land, is the cause of the farmer's distress, for that is what brought him a borrower to the bank counter. Once entered there as a borrower, there is little hope for him while he continues the system which drove him to that dernier resort, even though the interest were nominal. The agony might thereby be postlonged, but would, in nine cases out of ten, come at last. All interest is usury, and human wisdom is not capable of drawing the line to fix a rate of interest that will not be oppressive to some borrowers. ELKTON FROM CHICAGO.

The correspondent of the Chicago Tribune, George Alfred Townsend, who frequently pays Elkton a visit, has recently been here, looking up items about the Postmaster General, who tells his Western readers is the coming man for the next President. The former has been recently built, and is decidely the finest building in the town; while the latter, which was erected in 1791, if the inscription on the vane that ornaments its cupola is not apocryphal, is an uncomfortable, inconvenient, barn-like sort of a structure, whose architect must have been a wooden-headed fellow, who entertained very unique ideas of the temple in which justice was to be administered.—This vane, by the way, which is a huge wooden itsh, was a symbol of the great staple of the country at that time; for the old inhabitants will tell you, with a sigh, that the SHAD AND HERRING


