

The Farm

KEEP A FLOCK OF SHEEP.

The season is now approaching when farmers, who have no sheep among their farm stock, should set about procuring a small flock of good thrifty ewes.

From twelve to twenty head of good ewes, for an ordinary farm of one hundred to two hundred acres, will be found a source of profit and labor to any other investment on the farm.

FLORICULTURE

The pot culture of ornamental plants annually increases, and is especially in vogue with ladies. As an elevating and refining recreation, and as a healthful exercise it deserves encouragement.

There is so much of art about pot culture that we rarely see a plant grown as it should be, a thing of joy and beauty. A few well grown specimens afford far more pleasure than a crowd that cannot have proper room in a crowd.

Now since potted plants are in an unnatural and difficult condition for growth, the amateur cultivator must strive to abate the evils of their condition that may differ as little as possible from that which the nature of a plant requires.

The vicissitudes of heat and drought are often aggravated by openly exposing the sides of the pot to hot drying air and even to the summer sun.

Now to keep the roots of our potted plants as nearly as possible in the same condition with respect to heat and moisture with those of plants growing in open ground, when we bring them out of doors, we must plunge the pot to the roots in the cool and moist soil of a close network of woven fibers on the outer surface of the ball of earth.

plant in open ground. To make amends for this we are careful to pot our plants in soil abounding in proper food, and when this first supply grows scant, we shift our plants from time to time to larger pots with fresh soil to feed upon.
