Upon your return you can trot brickly along, with a sense of comfort and security; whereas, in passing over it previous to the removal of the loose stones, you proceeded slowly and improved. If every town in those sections, where land is full of small boulders, would provide simply for the removal of them from the pathway as often as once in two weeks during warm weather, the roads would be more comfortable than if ten times the cost was expended in dumping on loads of sand, or ploughing up roadside soil and piling it on the driveway. We hope these hints will not be lost upon those who have our common highways in charge.


