The Feejees have offered their islands to Queen Victoria. These islands are one hundred and fifty-four in number, but sixty-live of which are inhabited, each with from two to ifteen thousand people. Two only are of considerable size, Viti Levu and Paon, or Sandalwood Island; but this title is no longer applicable, as the sandalwood for which it was once noted has long since been exterminated. The Feejee mountains rise to a height of several thousand feet, and possess marked outlines, sand feet, and possess marked outlines, including numerous sharp peaks. The climate is very pleasant, the country covered with rich verdure, and the soil readily yielding abundance of tropical fruits. Seeds of lettuce and similar "garden truck", spreat within tempt feet. truck" sprout within twenty-four hours after sowing, and in four or five weeks the vegetables produced are ready for the ta-ble. The aboriginal inhabitants, and there are few others, are savage, many of them keeping up their ancient customs of human sacrifices and of cannibalism. Missionaries, however, have made considerable progress in some of the islands, and Great Britain has extended its commercial facilities, especially from Australia, to no slight purpose. The islands produce tobacco and mgar cane, chiefly for commerce, and the people live on yams and other vegetables. The Feejce islands are situated in the South Pacific, east of the Hebrides, between lati-tudes 15 deg. 30 min. and 19 deg. 30 min. south, and longitude 177 deg. east and 178 deg. west.
