THE HORSE AS A WALKER.

Scientific American.

In breeding horses we breed for trotters, racers, &c., but never for walkers which is a great mistake, particularly if the horse is intended for the What the plowman wewalker, also ne-

...nts is a good ... or almost any kind of work on the farm, the road included.

Let us look a little at this. A good walker will walk with case four miles an hour; the best walkers will make five miles per hour. This is done with as much ease as the ordinary walker will make three miles. This, in ten hours' work, will make a difference of from ten to fifteen miles, which is clear gain, as the one horse will use no more exertion to do this, than the other in doing less. It is in the mechanical structure in the gait, and this is as susceptible of transmission as the trotting

or racing element. Take the ten or fifteen miles gain in a day and make the estimate for the year, and the sum will aggregate an amount that must surprise those who have never reflected on the subject. The one horse will do from one-quarter to two-fifths more work than the other, which is a consideration that cannot be afraid of being stung. ignored. Recollect it costs no more to keep such a horse. He walks with ease, while the other horse labors or must be on a small trot to keep up. This every one of us must have seen, and it irritates one to see it. A good walker will walk sixty miles in a day, allowing twelve hours for the day at five miles per hour. Will the trotting horse do it and come out at the end of the day as well as the walker?
