Thompson, at present of Philadelphia, have been issued. The ceremony will take place in Calvary M. E. Church, Sudlersville, Wednesday, August 7th, at 2.30 o'clock. Since a number of Centreville's beautiful homes, fences, etc., have been repainted, combined with the general air of cleanliness and the leafy green trees, it is one of the most desirable residence towns on the Eastern Shore, being up-to-date in all modern improvements and unsurpassed in architectural beauty. A horse belonging to Mr. Chas. E. Bishop, of Carmichael, threw the business section of Centreville into confusion last Friday afternoon by his mad antics. The animal had been driven to the town fountain for water and the bridle removed by a colored man who was driving it, when it became frightened, broke away and ran into the fountain, turning it almost around. James E. Skinner, on the Spear and Dudley farm, near Lambson Station, Kent county, has thirty ewes which gave him fifty-one lambs during the months of February and March, 1907. He is now having the second crop from the same ewes. One ewe gave five lambs in six months, and the five lambs are all living and doing well.

In discussing peach prospects Tuesday, several peach growers from the upper part of the county say that the crop is an entire failure. They declare that in some of the largest orchards not more than one basket of peaches can be found. The Pennsylvania Railroad has scheduled its station at Barclay for 4,000 baskets, but the growers say 400 will more than count the crop.

Mr. Edward H. Todd, manager of the Centreville Canneries of J. Langral and Bro., Baltimore, is putting the canneries at the Landing in thorough repair to handle the yield of tomatoes this year, which promises to be a very good one. A new boiler has been installed and many other improvements will be made. The hot season will arrive about the middle of August.

Graham, of Ingleside, who will remove to Chestertown shortly, has given a contract for the erection of a handsome dwelling to be built on the corner of West street, which he recently purchased from Mr. Claude Parks. Dr. Graham is well known in this county and has been a resident of Ingleside since his birth, practicing his profession with decided success among his many patrons. He will be greatly missed by his many friends and the citizens generally of that community.
