

Dear Sir—I was very much pleased to find in your last issue that you had brought before the public the great necessity of having a hospital of our own in Centreville, as discussed by the county physicians at a social gathering held recently. Thus the people will realize their welfare is always cared for. The need of such a Hospital is demonstrated week after week by unfortunate sufferers who have to travel over land and water for relief, enduring untold pain before they can gain admission into a hospital in an adjoining city, while within our county we have doctors who have practiced medicine from ten to forty years, thereby gaining experience, also the lately graduated doctors from well known colleges, with all the up-to-date ideas. Consequently one can easily see that most successful treatment can be had as well in Centreville as in other cities, provided a well equipped hospital can be established.

As you state, at Easton, Talbot county, such has been done, and is a paying institution, also giving great satisfaction. The State has given aid that the penniless may receive treatment as well as the more fortunate.

Salisbury, Wicomico county, has a very fine hospital and staff, attracting her patients from afar.

Why cannot Queen Annes profit by their example, and keep her sufferers, and the money that is constantly going out with them, at home? If our people will consider this question financially and realize that their family physician has their interest more at heart than the stranger, also understand how much greater the chances for recovery are in a quiet, well equipped hospital, with the doctor and trained nurse at hand, than even in a private residence, they will then agree with the writer that Queen Annes county will be benefitted by a hospital.

Mr. Editor, I hope both the physicians and laity of our county will express their opinions on this question through your columns.

Dear Sir: Take a two-story house and reckon the costs with different paints; you will be surprised. Say the house has a total of 3210 square feet.

Divide by 300; you buy 11 gallons. That's the rule; but it never comes-out so.
