THE STATE

Incomplete returns from the entire State show that Judge Austin L. Crothers has been elected Governor by a plurality of 9,369, of which 4,311 comes from the city. His colleagues on the State ticket—Dr. John W. Hering for Comptroller, Mr. Isaac Lobe Straus for Attorney General, and Mr. Caleb C. Magruder for Clerk of the Court of Appeals—were also elected by substantial majorities. The Democrats carried the Legislature by a large majority, thus reversing the election to the United States Senate of Hon. William Pinckney Whyte for the short term and Hon. John Walter Smith for the long term.

In the city the entire Democratic ticket was successful and at the same time was there any danger about any candidate on the ticket except Judge Crothers. His vote was one of the surprises of the election. It had been fully expected that he would run far ahead of his ticket and the fact that Judge Niles was ahead of him in nearly every precinct was considered an astonishing feature.

The indications from the latest returns from the counties are that the Democrats will again have a two-thirds majority in the Legislature. Chairman Vandiver estimates the Democratic membership of the House at about 60, and this would be a clear two-thirds majority.

Ex-Governor Smith, for United States Senator, will have a clear majority of the Democratic caucus.

Outside of the city the ticket was solidly supported by Democrats, and a particularly good showing was made for Judge Crothers on the Eastern Shore. Here every county except Dorchester went for the ticket and Dorchester gave Gaitther only a small plurality—less than 200—although it had been claimed that it would give him at least 500. The returns from the Eastern Shore seem to indicate that the oyster vote did not cut the figure in the campaign that was expected, and the Mudd-Jackson combination failed to hold the second, third, and fourth districts of the ticket on the Eastern Shore as well as due to the Democratic vote.

The carrying of Kent and Talbot counties by substantial majorities, was a heavy blow to the Republicans. The election of both the Democratic candidates for Judge Messrs. Adkins and Hopper, in the Second Circuit, was one of the things that somewhat surprised the Democrats in other parts of the State. It had been expected that the Republicans in this circuit would elect at least one of their judicial candidates but they failed, and Judges Adkins and Hopper won by a good margin. The State outside of the city did

its part splendidly in bringing about the result. It gave a plurality for Crothers of something over 500.

The counties which are lined in the Democratic column are Anne Arundel, Baltimore, Carroll, Cecil, Harford, Howard, Kent, Montgomery, Prince George's, Queen Annes, Somerset, Talbot, Worcester.

St. Mary's went for Gaitther, and will have to be put in that column, but it went for the remainder of the Democratic State ticket, elected a Democratic local ticket and one of its two members to the legislature is a Democrat.

The other counties which lined up under the Gaitther banner were Alleghany, Calvert, Charles, Dorchester, Frederick, Garrett and Washington. It was not plain sailing for the Republicans by any means. In Alleghany, where they were counting on 1,000 plurality, they got 1,000, with one precinct (Prothman) missing. That may run it up to 1,200 but no more. The Democrats elected Ford, one of their candidates for the Legislature, leaving four delegates to the Republicans. Calvert elected one Democrat and one Republican to the Legislature, and elected a Republican to the State Senate. But it gave a heavy plurality for Judge Hering for General Wilcox, a man heavier than had been expected.

Congressman Maud, of course, carried his home county, but his candidate for the post was defeated. Dorchester almost goes in the Democratic column, the Republican plurality being only about 100, and even then a Democrat will go to the Legislature from there—Webster, who defeated James Garrett was with the Republicans. Washington found hard to get into the Democratic column, but lost by 200. Even Secretary Betts, who is one of the best representatives the county ever had in the Legislature, was defeated, in the right of many Republicans. Four out of the members of the legislature are Republicans, one Democrat getting in.

There were some absent minded judges of election, on duty and in Cecil these cast the Democratic about 100 votes. Out of the 182 rejected ballots the judge forgot to put his initials on 34 cast by Democrats, which invalidated them. Much complaint was heard from all over the State about the size of the ballot and the difficulty of voting it, and the number of ballots rejected because they were improperly marked was very large.

Senatorial Primaries

In the Senatorial Primaries Ex-Governor Smith gets a majority in the county of 718, receiving a majority of votes in every district in the county except the Third, where Governor Warfield beat him by 24 votes. The official table follows:
