

BAY FERRY SEEMS SURE

Project To Connect Annapolis With Eastern Shore Points.

The establishment of a regular passenger and freight business between Annapolis and points on the Eastern Shore of Maryland seems assured.

Representatives of the Washington, Baltimore and Annapolis Electric Railway Company, and the Electric Express Company, which operates a service of fast electric cars between Annapolis, Washington and Baltimore, have made overtures to the Annapolis City Council for wharfage facilities at the foot of King George street in Annapolis.

The plan was placed before the City authorities by David W. Anthony, attorney for the two companies, and E. W. McCormick, secretary of the freight company at Washington. The plan is to run two fast steamers into the heart of the trucking section of the Eastern Shore, connecting with Annapolis one to run by day for the passenger traffic, while a night boat will carry the produce.

The railway company already has a spur of track down to the foot of King George street, from its loop around the city this provision having been made when the road was first built, in anticipation of traffic with the Eastern Shore some time in the future. Officials of the two companies are willing to pay the city a reasonable compensation for the wharfage facilities.

This project has been mooted for some time, though the arrangements are just beginning to take some definite form. It is believed that the coming of this steamboat line will work a great benefit to the commercial interests of Annapolis, as the geographic location of the city has always been a setback. But with this new line the city will become something of a distributing point, and there will be a great saving of time either to Baltimore or Washington.
