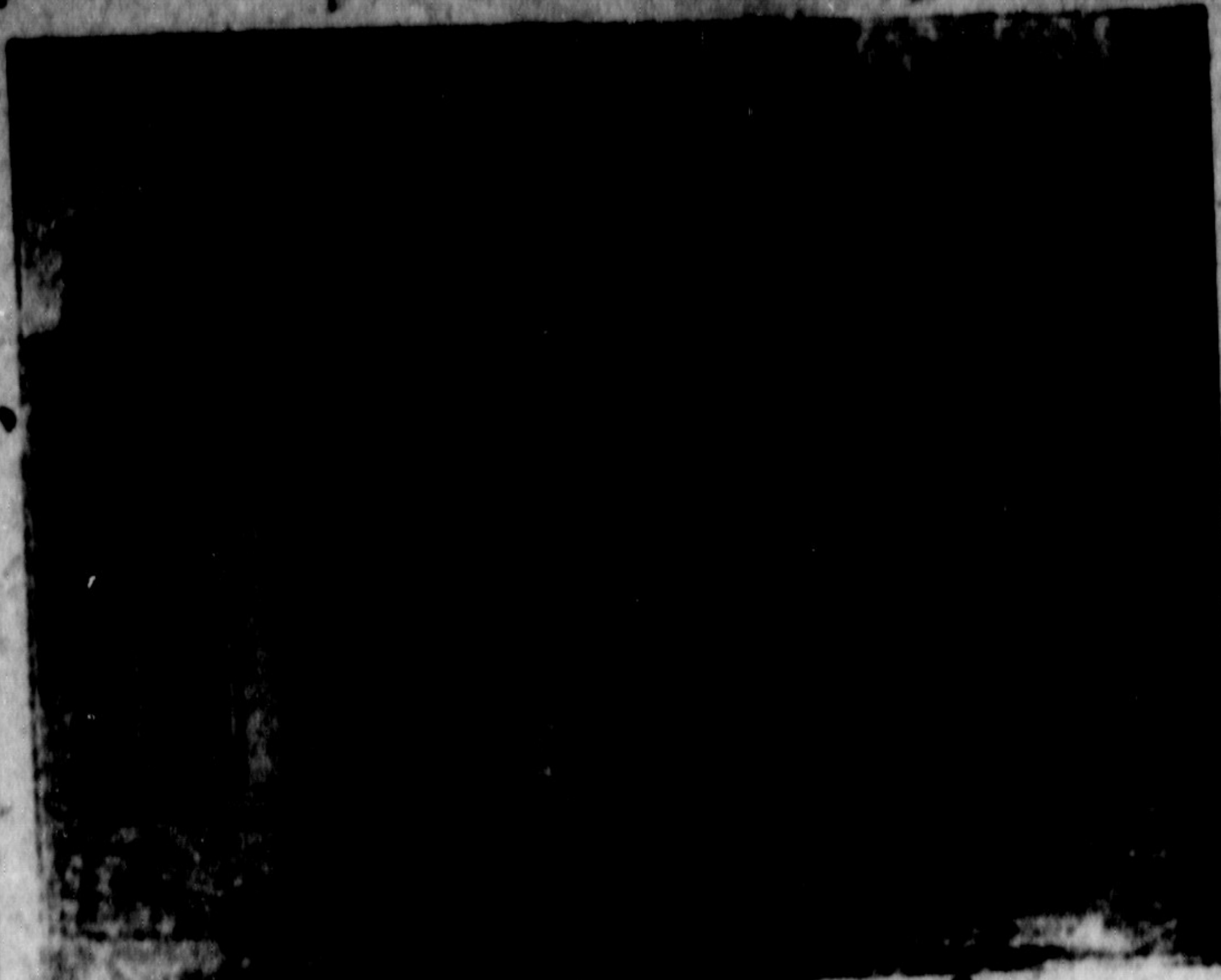

On Tuesday, October 23rd, the Board of Election Supervisors ordered its Clerk to prepare the official ballot and have them printed. Mr. Tucker, in order to save cost in the publication and printing of this ballot, ordered it placed in three columns, and decided upon the simplest fold possible for a three column ballot. Mr. Milton Price, a member of the Board of Election Supervisors, consulted with Mr. Tucker with reference to the size and fold of the ballot. The order for printing them was given to the editor of the OBSERVER, who went to Matthews that night for the purpose of having this ballot put in type, since both the OBSERVER and Board officers had not sufficient 12 point type to set the ballot up. On Wednesday the ballot was arranged as directed in three columns and instructions given the printer to fold it exactly as had been decided upon by Mr. Tucker in the presence of Mr. Milton Price. At 7 o'clock Wednesday evening, after the ballot had been set up and electrotyped, the editor of the OBSERVER received a telephone communication from the Clerk to the Election Supervisors to the effect that he had just found out that the official ballot was printed in four columns instead of three.

As stated above, this was absolutely necessary and was done only after the change had been made in the arrangement of the ballot. The folds, however, remained just as simple as the first one determined upon, the only difference being that the ballot is folded first three times from left to right, and then twice from top to bottom, whereas with the three column ballot it was ordered folded two times first from top to bottom and then three times from left to right.

This, then, is the trick perpetrated upon the people of this county, as charged in the last issue of the Record.

Mr. James T. Bright, the editor of the Record, knows full well why this change was made, and, furthermore, knows that it was not done for the purpose of deceiving any one. There is, then, no sincerity in THIS cry of "Trick Fold." But it is simply a rebuke of the same old game played by this organ during the entire campaign of trying to fool the people.

Democrats, remember your ballot should contain 25 X marks if you want to vote for every candidate. The name of Robert W. Thomas, Democratic candidate for Register of Wills, appears on the official ballot at the bottom of the third column, below all the County Commissioners. Don't overlook it.

A Remarkable Career

General Sam Houston was not only a great Texas, but probably the most striking and commanding figure which has yet appeared in the public life of the far southwest—born in Virginia, taken to Tennessee at an early age, whence, while yet in his teens, he went to war with Andrew Jackson against the Creek Indians; desperately wounded in the battle of the Horseshoe Bend; adjutant general of Tennessee and a representative in congress from that state; governor of Tennessee in his youth; married, separated from his wife in two months, resigning immediately as governor, self exiled for years among the Cherokee Indians, emigrating to Texas in 1832; member of the convention of 1833, which declared Texas to be an independent republic; general and commander in chief of the army which achieved independence at San Jacinto; twice president of the republic, United States senator and governor of the state.—G. A. Callahan in Scribner's.

John Doe Proceedings

"John Doe" proceedings were abolished by law in Great Britain in 1852. Previous to that time John Doe had figured in the old fashioned ejectment action for the recovery of the possession of land, together with damages for the wrongful withholding thereof. For various reasons of convenience and history dating from the reign of Edward III. A did not proceed against B directly in such a case. Instead A delivered to B an entirely false statement from the fictitious "John Doe" that A had devised the land to "John Doe" and that "John Doe" had then conveyed it to B by the county summons "Richard Roe." This fiction informed B that he was not going to defend the action himself, but B must do it, and so on. Occasionally, by way of variety, "John Doe" gave place to one "Goddittle."

Columbia River Three Samed.

The Columbia river has had three names. It was first called the Oregon. Afterward it was called the St. Rogue, but when it was discovered by Robert Gray in 1792 it was given the name of his vessel, the Columbia, in place of the two floating appellations, Oregon and St. Rogue. According to Whitney the original name of the river was the Oregon, "big ear" or "one that has big ears," the allusion being to the custom of the Indians who were found in its region of stretching their ears by holding them and crowding them with ornaments.
