



Trader's License .- The amount to be paid by Traders for license is \$12.55 to \$150.55, according to the amount of stock on hand at the principal season of sale, amount to be given under oath Females vending millinery and other small articles of merchandise, whose stock does not at any time during the year, exceed five hundred dollars shalf be entitled to a license on paying \$6.56, but if stock exceeds five hundred dollars shall pay the same rates as other persons, the amount of stock in trade

Licenses To Owners And Keepers Of Stalliens And Jacks. The owners or keepers of every Staltion or Jack shall, before being permitted to stand or station such animal. pay to the Clerk of the Circuit Court of some one of the counties of this State the highest sum of which he intends to ask or receive for the season for one mare, and the receipt of the said clerk with the seal of his court attached thereto for said sum, shall be the license for stationing or standing such Stallion or Jack for one year thereof; provided, that in no case shall the sum directed to be paid by this section for license be less than \$10, and
