

Trader's License .- The amount to be paid by Traders for license is \$12.55 to \$150.55, according to the amount of stock on hand at the principal season of sale, amount to be given under oath. Females vending millinery and other small articles of merchandise, whose stock does not at any time during the year, exceed five hundred dollars shall be entitled to a license on paying \$6.55, but if stock exceeds five hundred dollars shall pay the same rates as other persons, the amount of stock in trade
