cent "drive" for 800 Navy recruits in response to the President's first call for volunteers, the Navy recruiting authorities of the Maryland District are preparing for a "follow-up" campaign throughout the state, and Lieutenant P. L. Wilson, Recruiting officer of the Maryland District, is already sanguine of good results.

Maryland was the only State in the Eastern Naval Division that was successful in raising, in the prescribed period, the full quota assigned by the Bureau of Navigation. Both Rear-Admiral Palmer, Chief of the Bureau of Navigation, and Lieutenant Commander Grady, Recruiting Inspector of the Eastern Naval Division, have congratulated the State on its success in raising the quota.

The close of the intense campaign waged throughout the State during the "drive" for 800 enlistments before April 20th, seems to have left the impression among a large number of peopit that Maryland has fulfilled its obligations to the Navy. Such is not the case, says Lieutenant Wilson.
