

fowls, the bulletin says: "The way in which frozen birds are Chestertown, Maryland, thawed makes a great difference in tion it used to be customary to thaw them by sonking in cold water, but this has been proved undestrable, not only because the water is very likely not to be clean, but also bécause sonk. ed birds go off in quality very rapid-Sonking in hot water, as is some times done in market for a 'rush order' is even worse. A much better way to to keep the birds for 24 hours at ordinary ice-box temperature (45 to 50 degrees F.) As has been already stated. the sooner the birds are used after thawing the better, and whenever possible should be bought stiff and thawed at home. This means buying poultry a day before it is needed, but it is ! the surest way of having it properly thawed in warm weather it should be put in the refrigerator to thaw, but in old weather a moderately cool room will do as well. If it is impossible to do the thawing at home, the marketman should not be allowed to do it until short time before delivery.

"Although frozen poultry is hardly o be chosen when fresh birds are in market, it undoubtedly has the advantage of furnishing chickens, turkeys and other birds when the natural supply to locking and thus increasing the variety of the meat list."
