

Alfalfa, being a deep feeder, obtains a considerable portion of its mineral elements below the range of other plants When it has thee established itself this is a means of increasing, to some extent, the phosphorus and potash content of the upper soil. When well inoculated, it increases the nitroen supply of the soil by getting it from the air. Phosphorus, potash and calcium are removed in larger amount by an average crop of alfalfa than by any other farm crop, especially since sev-

eral crops are removed each year and for a series of years. If the crop is removed and he provision made for the return of plant food taken up by the plant, it is seen that, altho there is an increase in the nitrogen supply, there will be a rapid depiction of some of

When considered as an average crop per year, alfalfa uses six times as much phosphorus as the average crop and four times corn. It uses three times as much potash as the average crop of timothy or clover and thirty times as much as a crop of wheat It is therefore a mistaken idea that after the growth of alfalfa is well started, it requires no further attention as to fertilizing After the last cutting, we should use a good applica
