NATIONAL CONSERVATION COM-MISSION HOPES TO BE ABLE TO MINIMIZE LOSSES FROM PREVENTABLE CONFLAGRA-TIONS, WORK HAS STARTED.

Realizing that every product of the nation should be strictly conserved. and that every effort to insure its preservation should be made, the national government has accepted the offer of the National Board of Fire Underwriters to detail a force of ex perts to try, if possible, to minimize the loss from fires. In the past millions of dollars worth of food-stuffs and valuable commercial products have been lost annually by fires that might have been prevented. Believing that many such fires can be avoided. the national government, through the Maryland Council of Defense, has designated that inspections shall be made of properties such as mills, leevators. and other establishments important to the sucsessful prosecution of the fund given by the German people will
