Surgical Notes.

President Woodrow Wilson, in a ringing address at the Pifth Regiment Armory, baltimore, Saturday night of last week, accepted Germany's challenge to win the war by force.

His address followed a two-hour review of mearly 12,000 troops from Camp Meade, and was made in connection with the opening o the Baltimore Liberty Loan campaign and the first anniversary of America's entrance into the war.

The President spent the entire afternoon and most of the evening in Baltimore, his address being the climan of a day that will ever

stand out in the history of Baltimore, Maryland and the nation. The salient points in the address are given below in concrete form:

This is our anniversary of our acceptance of Germany's challenge to fight for our right to live and be free, and for the sacred rights of free men everywhere. The nation is awaks.

We know what the war must cost, our utmost sacrifice, the lives of our fittest men, and if needs be, all that we possess. Men in America may be more sure than they ever were before that

the cause is their own, and that, if it should be lost, their own great nation's place and mission in the world would be lost with it. We have ourselves proposed no injustice, no aggression. We are

ready, whenever the final reckoning is made, to be just to the German people, deal fairly with the German power as with all others. They have answered, answered in unmistakable terms. They have avowed that it is not justice but dominion and the unhindered

execution of their own will. They nowhere set up justice, but éverywhere impose their power and exploit everything for their own use and aggrandizement; and the peoples of conquered provinces are invited to be free under their dom-

Are we not justified in believing that they would do the same things at their western front if they were not face to face with armies whom even their countless divisions can not overcome?

Germany has once more said that force, and force alone, shall decide whether justice and peace shall reign in the affairs of men, whether right as America conceives it or dominion as she conceives it, shall determine the destinies of mankind.

There is, therefore, but one response possible from us: FORCE, FORCE TO THE UTMOST: FORCE WITHOUT STINT OR LIMIT: THE RIGHTEOUS AND TRIUMPHANT FORCE WHICH SHALL MAKE RIGHT THE LAW OF THE WORLD AND CAST EVERY SELFISH DOMINION DOWN IN THE DUST.
