GASOLINE JUMPS CENT.

Local Dealers Ignore Price-Fixers In Lateret Raise.

Flouting price-fixers, Federal State, has become so common that it no longer excites comment, because fact, it is done usually by small retail. Sunset Pharmacy, make them immune from punishment. One of the latest examples of it is in the price of gasoline. Last week it was announced by the Fuel Administration in Washington that the price of gasoline would be advanced half a cent a gallon, but at the same time was expressly declared that this advance was merely to cover the increase in freight, and would not justify any greater advance than half a cent in the price by dealers.

Hardly had the announcement been made before nearly every gasoline dealer in this section of the State jumped his price, not a half cent, but a whole cent. The prevailing price had been 25 cents, but there are few places where gasoline can be bought now for less than 26 cents.
