The only plot whose condition at the close was justly subject to criticism was that handled by the Fordson tractor. For this there were apparently several reasons. In the first place the Fordson operator made an unlucky drawing in the allotment of the plots Most of the plot was low lying land without sufficient drainage and the soil, therefore, hard and baked Again and in consequence of its tendency to hold water, this plot was covered with a heavy sod of red top grass These untoward conditions might have been largely overcome by a thorough prepatory discing, but the Fordson operator used a light disc. went over the plot but once and at such rapid speed that the discs had no opportunity do effective work, but rather bounced along over the top of the heavy sod in consequence the plowing was poor ly done, the furrows turning up in a comparatively cloddy condition

Due perhaps to the same lack of proper preparatory discing and softening of the surface the Fordson tractor apparently found it difficult, if not impossible to maintain the required depth of seven inches in plowing The following is the fuel record for
