though the sky was ashamed to brighten over the ceremonies that made Rutherford B. Hayes President of the United States. There was little cheering, and what little there was came from those who hold office, or those who came on to try to get into them. The ceremonies were arranged by Boss Shepherd. Grant and Hayes rode up the avenue in an open carriage in the midst of the procession, civic and military, and probably no car riage-load in the line received less heartfelt respect. One of them retires after having done more than any man in our history to debauch. American politics, and the other enters steeped in fraud and odium at the very threshold.
