Col. W. W. Bowie, of the Maryland Farmer, delivered a very able and interesting lecture upon Agriculture before the faculty and students of the Maryland Agricultural College on Friday evening last. Col. Bowie spoke both theoretically and practically; he quoted Virgil's Georgics to show that much now under discussion was treated of in those days, viz: High culture, irrigation and drainage. The compost heap is not of modern invention. Whilst other sciences had rapidly advanced we are moving slowly
