Very few of our readers may be fully aware of the horrible nature of this tor ture. The victim is first thrown flat on his face, and legs bent up, so that the soles of the feet are horizontal; the feet are held in this position by a long staff and chain. One who had passed through the dreadful torture says: "At first the pain was excruciating, but my feelings in time became numb, and it was like beating a bug of wool. It was six weeks before I could walk even with crutches, and for more than three years my feet and ankles were very much swollen, and, though twenty years have elapsed since then, I still suffer."

That number of Indians, from the Cheyenne agency, have for two years been kept in the famous old fort at St. Augustine, Fla., and each had murdered one or more persons when he was sent away for an experiment in reformation.
