-Nature has certain laws; they are im mutable. In regard to perennial plants or plants with percanial roots, the law is that beginning with the spring growth the plant's duties are to perfect the previous summer and fall. This may be said to be the end of that plant's life, and if it was only an annual it would be so. But a perennial has, after arriving at a certain age and condition, to make preparation for a continued life next year. This is done by forming eyes or buds upon its roots, or around the collar of the stem, which shall, falthough perfect, remain dormant till next spring. There is a certain lapse of time between the maturity of the eld plant and perfection of

these eyes or buds. This time is of quite short duration, not more than one or two weeks, and is the critical time in that plant's life. Any attack upon the vitality of the part above ground is sure to kill that below, and of course the whole plant.

This gives us a clue to weed killing attacking a plant in its most vigorous season is but of temporary advantage, but if we take it at its weakest moment it succumbs readily.

This critical time does not come to all varieties of plants at the same time of the year, but may range from the middle of July to the first of September, as the particular kind matures early of late. Learn by observation when each kind of plant arrives at its moment of weakness, mit the certificates of farmers known to you and cut it down to the ground, the loss of foliage above totally prevents it from forming buds below ground.
