M. obtained by dividing their sum by 2. R. S. H. rain, snow, or hail (melted) during the 24 hours. Wind, force, graduated by Beaufort's scale (the highest) and 0 (a dead calm), taken at 4 P. M. GENERAL SUMMARY. MONDAY.

A restless tone, with few transactions or fluctuations, and no decided tendency one way or the other, is the account given of the condition of the London Stock market during the past week.

Reports of the Mining Lane markets the past week present no new feature of special interest. There have been large receipts of the new crop black teas, which were rather forced at auction and brought lower prices.

Despatches were received at the War Department on Saturday which tell of what is represented to be an important success achieved by Gen. Howard's command over the hostile Indians in Idaho.

Later accounts have been received at the Indian Office in regard to Sitting Bull and the various bands of hostiles who have crossed the border into Canada.

James Russell Lowell, the newly appointed United States Minister to Spain, sailed from Boston on Saturday for Liverpool.

The unexpected, and to a great extent surprising, announcement is made to-day that a body of Cossacks, who have crossed the famous Balkan Mountains and have penetrated as far south as the railway station between Yamboli and Adrianople.

United States has resumed the position of being the chief source of their cotton supply, much to the detriment of India, which sent nine hundred and sixty-five thousand cwt. less in 1876 than in 1875.

The National Cotton Exchange met in white convention at the Greenbrier Hotel, White Sulphur Springs, yesterday, delegates being present from most of the principal cotton centres of the country.

The Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company announce that they will sell one hundred and twenty-five thousand tons of coal at auction in New York on Wednesday, 25th inst.

The government party has triumphed in the Serbian elections. The Russians are in greater force beyond the Balkans than was thought possible.

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The bullion in the Bank of England has decreased fifty thousand pounds during the past week. The proportion of the Bank reserve to liability, which last week was 35 11-16 per cent, was yesterday 46 1-2.

A telegram from Southern cities to the call for a convention at Fort Monroe on the 25th inst., in the interests of Southern mail facilities indicate that large delegations will attend from all important cities in the South from Alexandria to New Orleans.

The tidal wave of May 10 at Nukshiva, one of the Marquesas group, in the Pacific, rose and fell all day, the greatest rise being 14 feet, swamping the plantations on Tallohae bay.

The Agricultural Bureau reports that the improvement in the condition and prospects of the cotton crop since the June report is just one per cent, ranging from six in the two Carolinas to the region in which small and healthy plants, with clear culture, promised the most rapid improvement under favoring suns.

The steamer Wisconsin, sailing from New York yesterday, took out one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars in silver coin. The specie shipments east from San Francisco for the past fifteen days were valued at \$7,500,000.

A great battle is reported south of the Balkans. The Sultan refuses the demand of the Sofias to begin a holy war. He is again said to favor peace.

The reported attack of Turkish monitors on the Sistova bridge is officially denied at Constantinople. The Russian movements in Bulgaria indicate an active campaign.

Advices from Gen. Howard, of this city, has resigned the position of Chief of the Soldiers' Home at Washington, D. C., and that he has occupied for the past few years.

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The new \$50 gold coin, which is to be struck from the mint in course of preparation by the officers of the government mint, will not be the first coin of that value in the United States.

The last new nonsense connected with fashionable school commencements is reported from a Massachusetts high school. The graduating class sent cards of invitation to the exercises of examination day, which were in the elegant and costly style of wedding invitations.

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A man blown to atoms.—An appalling accident happened on Wednesday morning near Catonsville, Baltimore county, caused by the explosion of a patent gasometer, and resulting in the instantaneous death of a plumber named Philip Wehrheim.

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The Great Strike on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, which commenced Monday last, soon culminated in a general strike all along the road, has been the absorbing topic of the week.

The protection given by the United States military on the Baltimore and Ohio railroad in West Virginia has repressed the disorders of the night train strikers and enabled several trains to proceed.

There was quite a flurry in financial matters in Chicago yesterday, and the run and sell on the market was such that all the savings banks posted up notices that the thirty day rule would be enforced. It is insisted that the banks are in a perfectly healthy condition, and that the rule is only appealed to as a means of protection and of removing all possibilities of panic.
