As I have touched upon the subject of electricity or lightning, it may not be uninteresting to some of your readers to have the opinion of Mr. Benjamin Hallowell, in regard to the cause of the phenomenon usually called the Aurora Borealis. Whilst at Princeton, N. J., in the year 1852, the phenomenon was remarkably brilliant, of which I spoke in a communication to the said gentleman, a highly esteemed preceptor, then living in Alexandria, Va., in charge of his school. He wrote to me in reply, that the phenomenon was visible in Alexandria at the same time, and was unusually brilliant. He thus accounts for the appearance: "I have no doubt the phenomena are owing to the air being in a high electrical state from the condensation of vapor in the formation of snow or rain, while the surface of the earth, in those parts is insulated, either by a covering of snow or a stratum of very cold and dry air, and that thus the electricity has to seek an equilibrium through the upper more rarefied air, which is a better conductor, and the remaining vapor in the air, by the motion of electricity, giving the soft, diffused light, always accompanying such phenomena."
