> -- The shipment of grain to Europe on Saturday by steamers alone from New York amounted to half a million bushels, and sailing vessels during the week took much more. The shipments this season have thus far exceeded those of last year by nearly 40 per cent. The winter demand by Russia and Turkey cannot yet be fully estimated, but shipments are going forward on the supposition that their needs will be great. The short crop of England, added to the fact that numerous cargoes of flour have been sent from England to India, also increases the foreign demand for our cereals. Our crop of wheat this year is not only larger than value of \$8,82,036, against only \$1,775,-101 for the same period last year, and of mutton, \$113,500, against none in 1846.
