Work and Wages.

At Cambridge, Mass., tanners are paid \$3 per week, clean hands \$9, curriers \$10, splitters and engineers \$14, shavers \$13 and finishers \$10.

The carriage factories of New York and Brooklyn are doing a fair business, although not running at full capacity.

The millinery and dressmaking trades are brisk at the present in all large centers of population.

The demand for female domestic labor seems always active, and good servants command high wages in addition to their board and lodging.

There is more activity in the carpenter trade in Boston now than there has been for several months.

In the stone quarries near Charleston, S. C., stonecutters and mangleworkers get \$15 per week, helpers \$9, polishers \$8, Boston and \$7.

Europe produces on an average 5,000,000,000 bushels of grain, of which Russia produces one-third, Germany and Austria 500,000,000 bushels each, and France 500,000,000.

Recent returns show that cigarette smoking has of late years enormously increased in France.

The Columbus (Ga.) Enquirer says: 'Lincoln and the adjoining counties in Mississippi a strike has commenced, not for higher wages, but lower prices.'

The shipment of grain to Europe on Saturday by steamers alone from New York amounted to half a million bushels.

The prisoners in the St. Louis jail, especially the negroes, believe it is haunted, and are in a state of algeat terror.

Extensive forgeries on Canadian bank notes have been discovered. A man named James McFarlane, of the West, has settled in Quebec, and opening accounts at the banks has victimized the following: Bank of Montreal, Union Bank of Lower Canada, Ontario and Merchants' banks.

Verment has a law making rumblers liable for damage arising from drunkenness caused by their liquor, and under a verdict of \$2,000 has just been secured by a Reedsboro woman.

The Mark Lane Express in its usual weekly review of the British corn trade says: 'The weather during the past year was very fine. Appearance of an early and severe winter would in general have been a great advantage to the farmer as it costs them 25 per cent on their investment to do business on a credit.'

King Kalakaua said to a correspondent of the San Francisco Chronicle: 'The labor question of this kind is not a new one, and the population, employers have been compelled to resort to such labor markets as were open to them.'

Death of Hon. Thomas Donaldson. The following dispatch has been received just as we go to press: Died, at his late residence, 'Edge-wood,' Howard County, on October 23, 1877, at the age of 63 years, Thomas Donaldson, in the sixty-third year of his age.
