> > -The Philadelphia Iron Age, in an article giving statistics of imports of tin plates into different United States ports, says the imports of that article into Baltimore have declined, while into Philadelphia they are largely inceased. The fact, as far as Baltimore is concerned, is that up to date 180,000 boxes of tin plates have been brought to Baltimore in 1877, against 157,000 in the same time last year, an increase of 23 000 boxes. It is more likely true that the increase reported at the port of Philadelphia is because of a general linerease of consumption of tin plates in the country, and that Baltimore holds her own in importing that article.

The observance of the day in modern times is confined to religious services in the churches. In ancient times a custom prevailed among the Catholics of lighting fires upon the hills on All Saints night, the eve of All Souls, this being an emblem of immortality and indicating the faith of the people in the infallible doctrines of the Church on that subject, and to typify the ascent of the soul into heaven. In some localities the inhabitants baked a large cake in the form of a triangle, turrowed round, which was to be esten at night. This practice gave the name of "cake night" to the evening of the day.
