**TURKISH LOVE OF WATER.**—A Turk  
thinks he can do nothing so grateful to  
God and man as the setting up of a fountain  
by the roadside or in the streets of  
the city, where the wayfarer and his ani-  
male may appease their thirst and bless  
the name of him who provides for their  
want. Often in my travels, says a corre-  
spondent, I have halted beneath the shade  
of a wide-spreading plane tree to slake my  
thirst at the limpid waters of a marble  
fontain, and to repose from the noonday  
heat. There is always something edifying  
about the Koran, that "Water is the gift  
of God, and blessed is he who distributes  
it," or that "Water is the source of health  
and life," etc. There is a practical piety  
in these monuments of charity that speaks  
well for the benevolent disposition of the  
Mussulman. The Turks are great con-  
sumers of water, and they are good judges  
of its quality and nice in what they use.  
The favorite water, that is sold at a para  
in the streets, is from Asia; either from  
Tchamildji, on the mountain about Sen-  
tui, or from Karakouk, some ten miles  
up the Bosphorus, several miles inward  
from Belcos. This is brought to the land-  
ing in barrels, on horses' backs put in  
luges, and in this way carried to Con-  
stantinople before daylight. Notwith-  
standing the length of the journey, it is  
as clear as crystal. The venders cry it as  
"Bosz gubul"—as good as ice. A pasia  
will drink two goblets at a swallow. As  
water is said to have fattening properties,  
the huge draughts, they take of it may  
be the cause, in part, of the obesity  
to which both sexes of the Turks are  
subject.

**EASTERN EGGS.**—The custom of eating  
eggs at Easter has been traced up, not only  
to the theology of Egypt, but to the  
philosophy of the Persians, the Gauls, the  
Greeks and the Romans, all of whom re-  
garded the egg as an emblem of the uni-  
verse and the work of Deity. "Easter,"  
says Cebelin, "and New Year's have been  
marked by similar distinctions.—  
Among the Romans the New Year is  
looked upon as the renewal of all things  
and is noted for the triumph of the sun of  
nature, as Easter is with the Christians for  
the Sun of Justice, the Savior of the  
world, over death by His resurrection." The  
early Christians in Mesopotamia had  
the custom of dyeing and decorating eggs  
at Easter. They were stained red in  
memory of the blood of Christ shed at His  
crucifixion. The Catholic Church adopted  
the emblem of the resurrection, as is evi-  
denced by the benediction of Pope Paul V.  
about 1610, which read thus: "Bless,  
O Lord! we beseech thee, this Thy crea-  
ture of eggs, that it may become a whole-  
some sustenance to Thy faithful servants,  
eating it in thankfulness to Thee on ac-  
count of the resurrection of the Lord."  
Thus the custom has come down from  
ages lost in antiquity.
