OYSTER AND EATING HOUSES. The license to be paid by the keepers of oyster and eating houses is \$50.60.

Females vending millinery and other small articles, whose stock is not over \$500, pay a license of \$6.69; but if over that amount they are required to pay the same license as other persons—oath to be made as to the amount of stock at the principal season of the year.


