He walked distance between the threads being the same as the distance between the grooves on the cylinder. The cylinder is covered with a sheet of tin-foil-you will see it operate by and by -and when the cylinder is revolved the steel point presses the tin-foil into the spinal groove. If now the diaphragm be made to vibrate by the voice the steel point makes a series of indentions in the tin-foil grooves corresponding to the sounds uttered. On going over again the same groove with the stee point, by setting the cylinder again at the starting point, that is, by going over the same ground, the indentations in the tinfoil cause the membrane again to vibrate precisely as at first, thus reproducing the sound orginally made. The same soundwave you first made is returned to you in whatever shape you made it. Your words, for example, are preserved in the tin-feil, and will come back upon the application of the instrument years after you are dead in exactly in the same tone of voice you spoke them in,"

This ongueless, toothless instrument, without laryox or phyarynx, dumb, voiceless matter, nevertheless mimics your tones, speaks with your voice, utters your words, and centuries after you have crumbled into vain word that you choose to whisper against this iron diaphragm."
