In California they never talk about the number of bushels in a crop. It is always stated as so many tons. Speaking of the wheat crop reminds me of the tule lands, end the curious way of cultivating them. Please pronounce tule as though it was spelt tools. Tule is the name of the reed that grows ten feet high on the soil. The tule lands are those vast alluvial bottoms in the great valleys, traversed by the larger rivers that come down from the mountains to the sea. The river banks are dyked by Chinese cheap labor to keep off the waters of the stream from the tule lands on which the crop is to be raised. The tule lands are black much of the richest sort, and bear enormous crops of wheat. Seventy-five bushels to the acre, and down to forty is what they name. The lands are too watery and soft-bottomed to be plowed in the ordinary manner. So to prevent the horses from being mired, wooden shoes, 9 by 11 inches, screwed on the iron shoes, are put on the feet of the four horses that draw the plow. Very light plowing answers. Then the wheat is sown broadcast with a hand machine. The land being soft and miry drag in the seed wheat in the usual man-

Therefore flocks of sheep 500 in a flock, are driven over the field after the seed has been scattered, and the sheep tread in the seed as well as it could be done by harrowing or dragging.
