GENERAL SUMMARY. MONDAY.

A Portville (Pa.) dispatch announces that there will be a general resumption of mining in that section to-day, after a suspension of two weeks.

Everything passed off quietly at Montreal, Canada, Friday night, and on Saturday the military from outside the city returned to their homes.

The attorney general of New York has given an opinion that the State law exempting real and personal property of ministers of the Gospel or priests, not exceeding \$1,500 in value, applies to all who are regularly ordained by any religious body, and does not require actual pastoral charge of a congregation, nor actual and official relation to a church at the time of the assessment.

In some lines business has been very active at New York for some days. Within the last three days of last week the sales of corn amounted to 2,500,000 bushels, of which 1,500,000 were sold on Friday, and the sales of wheat reached about 300,000 bushels.

Dr. W. F. Carver, of San Francisco, has accomplished in New York the wonderful feat of breaking 5,500 glass balls with a rifle, thrown from hand, at a distance varying from ten to twenty feet, in 8 hours 31 minutes.

The professional orators, Courtney and Haulon, have agreed to have a five-mile scuffling race for \$5,000. It will probably take place on Owassa Lake, N. Y.

It is now believed that the power of the insurgents in South Africa has been destroyed.

Peace was signed at Berlin Saturday. A synopsis of the treaty is published.

Winawer, the Russian, still leads in the Paris chess congress.

An Anglo-Russian understanding is on the tapis.

Col. Mackenzie's recent invasion of Mexican soil caused considerable excitement at the City of Mexico, the people believing that Mackenzie acted upon a wide construction of his orders, and that their object was to raise a border war for annexation purposes.

The Assistant Treasurers have been instructed to pay out the silver dollars in their vaults to persons presenting checks if they desire them, in exchange for greenbacks or national bank notes in moderate amounts.

The Umattilla Indians, now said to have joined the hostiles, are connected by marriages with the Joseph band of Nez Percés Indians, and were with difficulty prevented from going to war last year.

It is expected that Lord Beaconsfield will be honored with a great popular demonstration on his arrival in London to-day. An important speech by the premier is looked for in Parliament.

Under orders from the United States District Court for West Virginia, the Greenbrier White Sulphur Springs will be sold at public auction on the 6th of August.

M. Krantz, chief director of the Paris exposition, and other prominent officials paid a formal visit to the American section yesterday.

Work was resumed yesterday in all the coal mines in the Schuylkill region, according to announcement.

The Pope has submitted to the cardinals a secret allocution indicating his policy towards the powers.

WEDNESDAY.

In Cincinnati, yesterday, a well-dressed stranger called for two drafts on New York for ten and twelve dollars, respectively, at the bank of Epp, Heidebreck & Co. Tickets were made out by the clerk, and as the latter was very busy he sent the stranger to the exchange clerk with the tickets, instead of taking them himself as usual.

The total number of deaths at St. Louis on Monday from the heat was fifty-four. Yesterday the heat continued intense, but there were fewer cases of sunstroke.

Cable advices from Ireland state that disease has broken out in the potatoes, to which the earlier sorts have already succumbed. Should the weather prove wet there is little doubt that the main bulk of the tubers will be entirely destroyed.

The Austro-Hungarian elections will take place in August. Sympathy with the Porte and hostility to the policy of Bosnian occupation are the strong features of the campaign in Hungary.

The clerk in the British foreign office charged with stealing a copy of the Salisbury-Schouvaloff agreement has been discharged from custody.

James Gordon Bennett and Miss Jeanette Bennett, his sister, arrived at New York yesterday, on the steamer St. Laurent, from Havre.

The German parliamentary elections take place on the 30th inst. The struggle against the Bismarck policy will be severe.

Lords Beaconsfield and Salisbury had a most enthusiastic welcome back to London yesterday.

Ten thousand nailmakers in England have struck for an advance of 30 per cent. in their wages.

THURSDAY.

Dispatches from Gen. McDowell announce that Col. Miles struck the hostiles at Umattilla, Oregon, Tuesday morning. After a stubborn fight of seven hours the entire command, including Bendire's and a company of cavalry, charged the hostiles, driving them in confusion several miles. The troops had two wounded, none killed. The Indians had five killed and a large number wounded.

The heat at St. Louis during the past ten days proved as severe in its results as the visitation of an epidemic. Within that period one hundred and forty-five deaths have occurred, and between 1,500 and 2,000 cases of prostration by heat in which medical attendance was required.

It is stated as a notable fact, and it is a good temperance lecture, that two-thirds of the men and women who died from the effects of the heat were either drunkards or habitual drinkers of strong liquor or beer.

The Greeks are maintaining a state of insurrection in Thessaly and Epirus, fearing that pacification there would enable the Turks to indefinitely postpone a compliance with the requirements of the Berlin treaty. The Ambassadors of the Powers are on their part delaying the despatch of Turkish troops in iron-clads to the Greek coast pending the efforts to set diplomacy in motion.
