Prison Discipline.

How it is Administered in Japan.

Some interesting particulars are given

in the Japan Gazette of the convict pris-

prison was founded by General Kwaji, resolved to introduce into Japan a system of imprisonment which shold be both humane and profitable to the State. With the cosent of the Government, he established, about five years ago, the Tsukuda-Jima prison, which is under the control of the police department, and in which the principal rule is that each prisoner shall contribute so far as he is able towards his own maintenance. At the present time there are 246 warders and other servants, whose monthly wages amount; to about £350, including the salaries of metal-lithium-which is only half the nine surgeons. The prison stands upon weight of an equal bulk of water.
