Scribner. In accordance with a plan of the editor, formed a year ago, the Midsummer Holiday of Scribner's Monthly opens with a portrait of William Cullen Bryant, engraved by Cole from a crayon drawing by Wyatt Exton, for which the poet gave repeated sittings during the past spring. The paper on Mr. Bryant's life and homes, which it was also planned to have with the portrait, is by Rev. N. Powers, and was written before the former's illness. The illustrations are about twenty in number and chiefly represent points d interest at or near the Cummington and Rostyn residences. Dr. Holland also writes editorially of Mr. Bryant, and The Old Cabinet contains an estimate of his standing as a poet, and a reprint of the curious original version of Thanatopsis.

There are also in this number four illustrated out-of-door articles, as follows: A Sea-port on the Pacific, by Mary Hallock Foote, whose picturesque drawings for her own text are thought to be among her most charming work: To South Africa for Diamonds! an interesting record of rare personal experience by Dr. William J. Morton, with drawings, including a large view of the great Kimberley mine by Moran; Sharp Eyes, a field paper by John Burroughs, with bird illustrations by Mrs. Fanny Eliot Gifford, who makes her debut as a magazine artist in this number; and Glimpses of New England Farm Life, by Row-land E. Robinson, introducing draughtsmen new to Seribaer in Messis, L. C. Tiffany, R. S. Guford, Henry Fariar, Jervis McEntee and Winslow Homer,—besides Mr. Shirlaw and Mr. Kelly

Falconberg, Mr. Boyesen's new novel of Norwegian and American life in the Northwest, begins in this number. The scene after the first chapter or two will be wholly in America. The motif of the story is to be found in the peculiar influences that favor or oppose the assimilation of the Norwegian immigrant to the duties and privileges of American citizenship. This, however, it is claimed, will not prevent Falconberg from being a charming and idyllic love story.
