GENERAL SUMMARY. MONDAY.

Prof. Lewis Swift, of Rochester, N. Y., who took observations in Colorado, states that he also saw Leverrier's apocryphal planet Vulcan, on the day of the eclipse...

At West Randolph, Va., early Saturday morning, Mike Winn rose from bed, took his revolver and shot and killed his sleeping child, aged ten months, and then shot and fatally wounded his wife...

Two tramps stopped at a farmer's house last week near Trenton, Iowa, were given a good dinner by the farmer's wife, and, finding that the husband would not be home till evening, outraged the wife and left her insensible...

White Bird, the hostile chief, with about forty warriors, has reappeared on the old battle-ground on the forks of Clear creek, above Kaniam, Oregon. He declares he will not surrender, but has come to get what belongs to him...

The results of the German parliamentary elections show the return of 93 conservatives, 110 liberals and 96 ultranationals. Sixty-six second ballots will be necessary.

The ratifications of the treaty of Berlin have been formally exchanged between all the powers except Turkey.

The civic honors to Lords Beaconsfield and Salisbury in London, Saturday, were very imposing.

It is stated that Cardinal de Luca succeeds Cardinal Franchi as pontifical secretary of state.

The Fenian Kelly has been liberated on account of ill health.

The independence of Serbia will be proclaimed on the 22d.

TUESDAY.

After a week's suspension there was a general resumption of work in the Schuylkill mining region yesterday. The Philadelphia and Reading Railroad Company have about 540,000 tons of their August quota to mine and ship...

The British House of Commons passed a resolution authorizing the issue of exchequer bonds to the amount of £3,000,000.

Mr. Hayes arrived at Newport, R. I., last evening, and will be the guest of Mr. Swayne at Cliff Cottage.

A Franco-American excursion to M. Menier's factory, near Paris, took place Monday.

The floods in Roumania have interrupted wagon road and railway transportation. Lord Beaconsfield is said to be driving at an early dissolution of Parliament.

The Austrians have entered Mostar, Herzegovina.

Three Russian corps have arrived near Varna.

THURSDAY.

A single scull boat race for the "fat men's" champion gold medal was rowed yesterday on Newtown creek, near New York. The only contestants that entered were James Hagan, weight 260 pounds, and Edward Jones, 276 pounds.

Reports received from several districts north of Gettysburg, Pa., represent that there is a scarcity of water, many of the streams being nearly dried from long drought, and much trouble is caused in working mines.

In the election at Louisville, Ky., yesterday, Blanton Duncan's labor national greenback party was utterly crushed, not

a candidate on the ticket getting a respectable vote. The election at Lexington, Ky., passed off quietly. The entire democratic ticket for county officers was elected by a majority ranging from 160 to 1,500.

Several reformers of labor appeared before the congressional committee at New York yesterday morning. A recess will be taken to-day till an early day. After the recess the committee will invite business men, bankers and merchants to appear before them.

The Austrian troops are now meeting with armed resistance in the occupation of Bosnia. At one place seventy Austrians were killed. In Herzegovina similar hostility is shown, and a sharp fight is reported.

The German revenues have fallen off heavily. The coming meeting of the finance ministers of the several German states at Heidelberg is intended to pave the way to an increase of taxation.

The arbitrators to decide the boundary between Ontario and the Dominion have given their award determining the northern and westerly boundary of Ontario.

The Russians have summoned the Rho-dope insurgents to surrender the territory in Eastern Rumelia now occupied by them.

Owing to the cabmen's strike in Paris only one-fourth of the usual number of cabs are on the stands.

The British government has decided to send a representative to the Paris monetary conference.

The Turkish commander of the fort at Famagosta, Cyprus, refuses to surrender.

The liberals are overwhelmingly ahead so far in the Hungarian elections.

WEDNESDAY.

A terrific storm, accompanied by thunder and lightning, passed over Phoenixville, Pa., Monday night, doing considerable damage. Robert Townsend and Edwin Roberts, of Philadelphia, were overtaken by the storm and took shelter under a tree, which was struck by lightning. Townsend was instantly killed and Roberts is not expected to recover.

The reservoir belonging to the Cam-on Water Company gave way between twelve and one o'clock at night, doing considerable damage. The large sash and blind factory belonging to Coon & Brain was swept away, with several barns and shops. Many dwelling houses were filled with water, the inmates barely escaping. Most of the bridges on Towanda creek have been swept away. No lives were lost.

Six hundred journeymen shoemakers of Chicago struck yesterday for an advance of wages from \$9 to \$12. They have refused an offer of the employers to compromise for \$10.50 per week. The employers declare that it is a liberal price, the best they can offer, and that if it is not accepted they can and will get their work done in the East at less prices.

Isaac Marton was nominated for Congress by the republicans in the fourteenth Ohio district, and Hon. T. J. Maginnis was nominated by the nationals. The democrats of the third Ohio district nominated J. A. McMahon for Congress. R. L. Gibson was renominated for Congress in the first Louisiana district, and E. W. Robertson in the sixth.

The Hungarian elections indicate considerable gains for the opposition to the government. The defections are the result of the dissatisfaction of the Magyar with the government.

The fever in Nicosia, Cyprus, is increasing, and the rents having increased likewise, Gen. Wolsley and staff will camp outside of town.

Royal B. Conant, the defaulting cashier of the Eliot National Bank, has been arrested by United States marshal, and put in jail in Boston.

George Drake, the variety actress who was shot in the neck by a jealous lover at San Antonio, Texas, Saturday night, died the next day.

Cove Bennett, whose name has been so conspicuously connected with the Smith murder in Jersey City, N. J., has been arrested.

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FRIDAY.

Senator Thurman will leave Washington for Ohio to-day, and will make his long-anticipated speech at Dayton on the 13th instant. It is said that he will then reply so far as the letter relates to his connection with the organization of the electoral commission, to Mr. Marble's recent letter to the World showing Gov. Tilden's antagonism to the electoral scheme.

The committee appointed in Boston to receive subscriptions for the Boston Belling Company met yesterday, and \$100,000 were at once placed upon the book by parties from Boston, Lynn and other places, the largest single subscription being \$50,000.

At Omaha, Neb., yesterday, the weather was the hottest of the season, the thermometer registering over 100 degrees in the shade. Four cases of prostration by the heat occurred one probably fatal.

Letters from Inquitos, the Peruvian naval station on the Amazon in South America, announces that deplorable reports have been received as to the sanitary condition of the laborers on the Madeira and Mamore railroad. A virulent fever had broken out and was carrying off numbers daily, while medical attendance was scarce and hospital arrangements were of the poorest description. The fever is reported to be of the same type as that which raged in Panama during the construction of the International oceanic railroad. The laborers spoken of are mostly Americans, taken out by the Collins Company.

A fast express train on the Pittsburgh, Cincinnati and St. Louis railroad Tuesday night collided with a freight train near Mingo Junction, Ohio, and the entire train wrecked. Fifteen persons were killed, including Frank D. Graham, A. W. Andrews and W. R. Johnson, postal clerks, and fifty were more or less injured. G. W. L. Morcare, a postal clerk, had his leg broken. Most of the other victims were immigrants.

One hundred armed horsemen went to the jail at Franklin, Tennessee, Tuesday night broke it open and took out Calvin Beatty, colored, aged 15, charged with having outraged a six year old daughter of Daniel Christian, a prominent citizen while returning from school last Friday. They probably hung him, but no trace of his body can be found.

The election in Alabama on Monday for State and county officers resulted in an overwhelming democratic victory, even the former republican strongholds having gone democratic by large majorities. The colored men in large numbers all over the State worked and voted with the democrats.

It is stated that the organizers of the Russian volunteer fleet have pocketed more than one half of the fund raised for the purchase of the vessel.

A coal mine explosion in England yesterday caught thirty-five men at work; all were rescued, but several were severely burned.

There was a fresh outbreak in Aachen last Monday. In one battle the natives lost 650 men and the Dutch troops 56.

The issue in the Turkish cabinet on the Austrian occupation of Bosnia continues to breed troubles and rumors.

The republicans of the ninth Illinois district have renominated Thos. A. Boyd for Congress.

The republicans of the sixth Ohio district have nominated J. L. Price for Congress.

Bogardus sails for the United States with the title of champion wing shot of the world.

The second Louisiana dist. democrats have renominated E. John Ellis for Congress.

The Franco-American conference on commercial treaty met at Paris yesterday. Great Britain will endeavor to obtain a reformed government for Crete.

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A terrific hail and rain storm passed over the region around Norwood, and Ontario, yesterday, unroofing and in some cases leveling houses and barns, uprooting trees and doing great injury to crops. Several persons were severely injured.

Frank L. McLain, a provision and produce dealer in Boston, was robbed of \$500, and pounded to unconsciousness while alone in his store yesterday morning. The thief is unknown.

Two fire engines collided at Chicago yesterday, killing fireman George Rau and badly injuring fireman Shagbushness. Both engines were running to a fire and met on a corner.

Suliman Pasha, with 1,500 Asiatic troops, is shut up in Trebinje, Herzegovina. Fifteen hundred Bosnian troops have deserted from Trebinje and joined the insurgents.

The Paris Constitutional confirms the report that Prince Louis Napoleon is to marry Princess Thyra of Denmark. She is a sister of the Princess of Wales.

The Porte has issued instructions to the officials in Bosnia and Herzegovina forbidding opposition to the Austrian occupation.

The result of the Hungarian elections shows a large majority for the liberals or supporters of the present government.

Cardinal Deacon Lorezo Nina has been appointed Papal Secretary of State, vice Cardinal Franchi.

The little craft Nautilus, from Beverly, Mass., June 12, has arrived at Havre, France, in 56 days.

By the Russian magazine explosion at Pralerni, Roumania, 55 persons were killed and 31 injured.

The substance of the project for a Franco-American treaty of commerce is published.

The English liberal, Hon. Wm. E. Forster, is coming to America this fall.

The rain at Newark, N. J., Tuesday morning washed the track of the Erie and Patterson road, delaying travel about an hour. In Newark the streets were flooded, and in Orange portions of Littlefield Park were badly damaged.
