MONDAY

Mehemet Ali Pasha, who was sent to Albania to pacify the natives, fell into a boat's net at Yavrova, north of Scutari.

A party of hostile Banocks were defeated on the 5th instant at Clark's Fork by a detachment of troops and Crow Indians.

Gen. Szapary defeated the insurgents on Thursday with a loss to the Austrians of 65 killed and 277 wounded.

The Manchester Guardian reports the market dull and unsatisfactory, both to buyers and sellers.

Four men are known to have perished by the burning of the Grand Central Hotel at Omaha.

John Richmond, who was arrested for investigating the murder of E. H. Cliff at Choptank, was taken from the train upon his arrival at that place.

Admiral Ingfield, of the British squadron at Newport, gave a grand ball on Saturday to the summer residents there in return for the hospitalities extended to him.

Two men, named Manley and Nougare, in custody at Maryland, Pa., charged with the murder of Patrick Stanton at Danesville, near Mahanoy Plane, ten years ago.

A bronze medal has been awarded to the Taylor Manufacturing Company of Westminster, Md., for their portable engines at the Paris Exposition.

The market for silver in London is in a very weak condition, and 52 pence per ounce is the actual quotation.

The gold premium ruled on Saturday at 100 1/2 @ 100 3/4, with most of the sales at the latter figure.

TUESDAY

The Hanover (York county, Pa.) Citizen says: "We are creditably informed that one of our cigar manufacturers has been obliged to suspend work, owing to the fact that the wholesale dealers to whom he sells his cigars, deal largely in the yellow fever-stricken cities in the South, and owing to the quarantine cannot sell at those places."

In Philadelphia last week an injunction was granted at the suit of Miss Fanny Davidson regarding the Wood's Museum from producing under the title of "The Loves of Olivia," a play which Miss Davidson alleges is simply an alteration of her play entitled "Olivia."

During the storm that visited the lower end of Lancaster county on Thursday, the wife of John Hetherington, residing near Oak Hill, was killed by lightning. She was sitting in the house surrounded by several of her children at the time, none of them injured, although they were seriously stunned.

The solicitor of the treasury at Washington has not yet completed his opinion for the consideration of the secretary concerning the deposit of the garbage in the lower bay of the port of New York.

A grand fête was held at Boulogne sur-Mer, France, yesterday, in honor of the passage of the law by the French Chambers appropriating 17,000,000 francs for the construction of a deep sea harbor there.

The British steamer Piereone, from Baltimore for Dunkirk, is ashore near the latter place. Her cargo consists of 51,951 bushels of wheat.

The Arctic whaling fleet at last accounts had not caught a fish, and it was expected the season would prove a failure.

The new German Parliament met yesterday. The Emperor's speech urged the adoption of the anti-socialist bill.

The rumor that M. Kramitz, director-general of the Paris exposition, has resigned, is denied.

Italy orders quarantine against ships from any part of the United States.

The Democrats in Boston held caucuses Monday evening for the election of delegates to the State convention.

Pieckey Bell, a white man, who had been jailed at Murfreesboro, Tenn., for killing a constable of Rutherford county in that State, while attempting to arrest him, was on Monday night taken out and lynched.

A special board of which Rear Admiral Wyman is president, convened at Washington yesterday, at the Navy Department, for the purpose of examining Lieutenant Commander Charles W. Tracy for promotion.

THURSDAY

The grand jury of Providence, R. I., has returned an indictment against the publishers of the Sunday Telegram of that city, for criminal libel.

The new iron steamship Gate City, left Beach & Sons' shipyard, Chester, Pa., yesterday, for New York, where she will enter the service of the Ocean Steamship Company.

A royal free pardon of the Fenians Melody and Gordon passed under the great seal of Great Britain Monday. They each required to quit the British dominions.

Francis Lacombe, a desperate character, residing near Plantagenet, Ont., shot his wife fatally last night without provocation, and then escaped to the woods.

The British flagship Bellerophon, and the Sirius and Argus left Newport, R. I., yesterday, for Halifax. The customary salutes were exchanged.

Chamberlain & Co., Cincinnati, who made an assignment Monday, place their liabilities at \$110,000, assets \$215,000.

The asphaltum factory of Lee, Reed & Co., at St. Louis, was burned with other buildings yesterday. Loss \$67,000.

A new weekly paper called The Standard, edited by G. Watson James, has made its appearance in Richmond.

Over six hundred ladies of persons drowned by the recent collision on the Thames have been recovered.

Cuba has accepted the invitation to send representatives to Constantinople to negotiate with the Porte.

A fire at London, Ont., yesterday, destroyed the Herald newspaper office and contents. Loss \$13,000.

The receipts of the Paris exhibition up to September 1 amounted to 7,112,219 francs.

The steamer Piermont, which went ashore eastward of Dunkirk, got adrift safely.

The authorities in France intend to prosecute socialist agitators vigorously.

The prefect of the Seine recommended a Paris municipal loan of \$65,000,000.

Nobeling, the would-be assassin of Emperor William, is dead.

The Austrians captured Kijine after a stubborn engagement.

At the Massachusetts State convention of the independent greenback party, which met at Boston yesterday, nearly one thousand delegates being present, General B. P. Butler was nominated for Governor of the State on a rising vote.

The Philadelphia democratic county convention met at the following nominations: For judges of the Court of Common Pleas, Hon. J. I. Clark Hane and Hon. M. Russell Thayer; for judges of the Orphans' Court, Hon. William N. Ashman and Hon. Clement B. Penrose; for recorder of deeds, Michael Nisbet; for clerk of Quarter Sessions, William D. Hendrick; for city commissioners, David Haggerty and Joseph C. McManamin.

There has just been issued under the auspices of the Secretary of the Treasury a 210 page volume, in which is collected all the laws of the United States relating to the prohibition of currency, including the coinage acts. The cases of the Governor therein embraced are quoted from the act of April 2, 1792, establishing a mint and regulating the coins of the United States up to and including the acts of the last session of Congress.

The President and friends spent yesterday forenoon visiting the Wisconsin State University, at Madison, and riding on Lake Mendota. They left at 1 o'clock for the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad for Milwaukee. The company, with Gen. Ledue, who went to Minnesota with the President, left Madison for Washington yesterday.

A cargo of 551 boxes of sugar, the property of Brugier & Co., New York, has been seized in Brooklyn on the ground of attempt to defraud the customs. Daniel Prentz, Eugene C. Prentz and John Prentz, who are accused of conspiring to defraud by the false weighing of the sugar were held to bail in \$2,500. Others are implicated.

Collector Cooper, at Knoxville, Tenn., telegraphs to Commissioner Ramm that Al. Wilson, one of the murderers of John Cooper, has been arrested and confined in Grason county (N. C.) jail. For the arrest of this man the government offered a reward of \$200, the State of Tennessee \$200, and Collector Cooper \$100.

At Fredria, Del., yesterday, John W. Hall, the democratic candidate for Governor, launched the schooner "Lizzie V. Hall," in the presence of a large assembly. It is stated, is the thirty-fifth vessel which Mr. Hall owns or has an interest in, having bought his first vessel property in 1838.
