GENERAL SUMMARY. MONDAY.

Congress at the last session passed a bill advancing Capt. Eads the pay for his jetty work on the Mississippi, but before it was paid some of his creditors claimed it should be paid them. The Attorney General decides that Congress in making the appropriation available was to enable Capt. Eads to continue his work, and not to pay his creditors. The Secretary of War will disburse the money accordingly.

The second Maryland Congressional district is getting its full share of candidates for Congress. Three Richmonds are now in the field, viz: Talbott, democrat; Milliden, independent democrat, endorsed by republicans; and Morling, independent greenback. The regular greenback convention is yet to be heard from.

Clerks in the departments at Washington having domiciles in the Western States, have been unofficially advised that they will be allowed ten days' leave of absence to go home and vote.

A six-year-old daughter of Wm. Rogers, of Warwick, Ont., bitten by a mad dog, died Friday, with all the symptoms of hydrophobia.

Henry C. Martin, charged with complicity in the forgery of a check for \$61,225 on the Union Trust Company of New York, has been discharged, the evidence being insufficient.

The British steamship Australasian docked at the Peninsula (Fla.) railroad dock Saturday for \$8,000 bales of cotton, the largest cargo ever shipped from any gulf port.

Italy proposes that, if the Egyptian administration becomes international, all the Mediterranean powers, not France and England alone, have a share therein.

In the libel suit of Congressman Page, at Ploverville, Cal., against the San Francisco Chronicle, the jury disagreed, ten for conviction, two for acquittal.

The store of S. B. Dobbie, at Lonaconing, Allegany county, Md., was burned Friday night. Loss, \$10,000; insurance, \$8,000.

Gilmore's Hotel and six other buildings at Junction City, Lane county, Oregon, were burned Saturday. Loss \$50,000.

Savage & Lyman, jewelers, Montreal, Canada, have failed, with large liabilities. Their chief creditors are in England.

The statement is re-asserted that England and other powers are urging the cession of Crete to Greece.

J. T. Maybury & Co.'s flouring mill, at New Orleans, was closed yesterday. Loss estimated at \$25,000.

Postmaster General Key and party sailed for Portland, Oregon, Saturday, for San Francisco.

The resignations of the whole Hungarian ministry have been accepted.

Ole Bull, the violinist, arrived at New York yesterday from Liverpool.

TUESDAY.

United States Minister Noyes telegraphs the Department of State that the French exhibition has been eminently successful, and in many respects the greatest that has ever been held in Paris. He further says that we have just reasons to be gratified in the American exhibit, although it was not as large as it might have been had the invitation of the French government been sooner accepted and the congressional appropriation been more liberal. As it is the United States will bear more prizes, than any other country. They will take seven or eight grand prizes and a very large number of gold, silver and bronze medals.

The comptroller of the currency has compiled a statement showing the number and capital of national banks that declared no dividends for the periods of six months each ended respectively March 1 and September 1, 1873. From this statement it appears that 323 national banks, with a capital of \$45,707,000, paid no dividend during the first period, and \$53,736,050, during the second. The ratio of earnings to capital and surplus of the national banks for the year 1873 was 6.9 per cent., in 1872, 5.6 per cent., and for 1873 less than 6 per cent.

There appears to be no abatement of the ravages of the yellow fever in the South. It is announced that the citizens' relief committee of Memphis have all the money, supplies, &c., they need, but there is a vast amount of suffering and want in other quarters. The fever is spreading in the interior towns, and the mortality everywhere in the infected district continues large.

Dr. E. Lloyd Howard, of Baltimore, and Dr. Jerome Cochran, of Mobile, of the yellow fever investigating commission, have arrived in New Orleans.

Judge Sutherland, of the New York Court of General Sessions, in his charge to the grand jury, dwells strongly on the practice of certain public officers of demanding fees to which they are not entitled. He had reference to the sheriff, county clerk and register, against whom such charges have been made.

Klebur White, colored, shot and instantly killed another colored man named Harry Coleman, in Henrico county, Va., three miles below Richmond, yesterday. Alleged cause, the seduction of White's sister, fourteen years old, and refusal of Coleman to marry her.

General Sherman is returned to Washington from his extended trip West and to the Pacific coast. He is in excellent health, and speaks in high terms of the various military posts which he officially visited, referring to them as models of neatness and efficiency.

Wm. Delaney and John Evans have been put in jail at Wilkesbarre, Pa., charged with the assassination of Philip Callender on the 16th of last January. The arrests are based on the statement of a notorious character named Bernard Times.

President Diaz, of Mexico, has organized a campaign against the Rio Grande Indians, and proposes to remove them to the Pacific slope. The report that the free zone had been abolished is pronounced untrue.

The insurrection in Santa Cruz has been quelled and the ringleaders captured. A disagreement between planters and negroes as to labor contracts caused the trouble.

The claim of Italy to the right to participate in the administration of Egypt introduces a new element of uncertainty into the Egyptian question.

The winners at Belmont Park (Philadelphia) trotting races yesterday, were Chance, Jersey Boy and William C. Best time by Jersey Boy, 2:26.

A fête will be given at the Trocadero Palace of the Paris exhibition on the 15th instant for the benefit of the yellow fever sufferers in the South.

The Emperor Francis Joseph formally accepts the resignations of the Cis-Leithan ministers, but orders them to remain provisionally in office.

The excitement over the collapse of the City of Glasgow Bank has subsided.

WEDNESDAY.

Justice Harlan, holding the United States Circuit Court at Chicago, decided yesterday in the Indianapolis, Bloomington and Western railway case that the right of redemption did not embrace railroad mortgages, and that the original decree of sale of the railroad should stand. In the case of the Saginaw, Jackson and Fort Wayne railroad he overruled the motion of the trustees to be put in possession under that clause of the deed of trust which gave them the right to possession upon default in meeting interest.

The Australian cricketers finished their game with the Canadians at Toronto yesterday, beating them, with eight wickets to spare. During the game the man in charge of the Australians' wardrobe absconded with five valuable gold watches. The home club and citizens entertained the Australians at dinner Tuesday night.

The Catholic members of the German Parliament recognize the dangers of the pending bill, but do not consider the pending bill the proper means for combating it. Prince Bismarck made a strong speech in favor of the bill.

Gen. Gilem J. Pillow, of Mexican war notoriety, and brigadier-general in the Confederate service, died at his place in the city of St. Francis river, Arkansas.

The wages of employes in the navy-yard at Portsmouth, N. H., have been reduced 20 per cent., and the men placed on half time, owing to deficiency in the appropriations.

Mr. Charles Embrey, former judge of the Orphans' Court of Washington county, died at Williamsport on Sunday week.

Gen. Grant will leave Paris Saturday for Spain, Portugal and Algiers. He will spend the winter in Paris.

Four thousand wagons, with Turkish Christian refugees, are following the retreating Russians.

FRIDAY.

A despatch from Dallas, Texas, says that heavy robberies of money and freight from the Texas and Pacific and the Houston and Texas Central railroads have been detected, and that many persons of high business and social standing, including oil-brokers, conductors and agents, with a number of citizens from St. Louis to Galveston, are implicated. Arrests are expected to be made immediately.

Near Decatur, Ill., Charles Everman and a neighbor engaged in a field battle over a cow, in which Charles Everman struck his neighbor three blows on the neck with a corn-cutter, severing the head from the body.

The ship 'Reir de Moza,' supposed to be from Mexico, has been towed into Port Royal, S. C., by pilots. She was deserted and a total wreck. Her cargo of mahogany is in good condition.

Dean Stanley made a pilgrimage Wednesday to the little knoll near Toppan, N. Y., where Major Andre was hanged. Andre's remains are in the Dean's keeping in Westminster Abbey.

The greenback State convention for the nomination of candidates for Governor and Representative in Congress will be held at Dayton on Wednesday next, 16th of October.

Hon. Samuel J. Poyard, for many years secretary of the old Cambridge and Andover Railroad Company, and at one time editor of the Cincinnati Enquirer, is dead.

The barn and out-buildings of Harris Page, near Milford, Del., were destroyed by fire Tuesday night. Loss \$3,000.

Fultz and Claxson Wheat.

As many of our readers are not acquainted with these varieties of wheat, we give a brief description of them. We have grown the Fultz two years, and it has done better than any other variety in the neighborhood. It is a smooth wheat, with short straw, and stands up better than any variety we have ever grown. The berry is not large, but very plump, and weighs well. Grown beside the Michigan Amber this year, it lacked six or eight inches of being as tall, but yielded nearly a third more grain to the acre, and several bushels more to the acre. We believe that city bushels to the acre can be grown of this variety without danger of lodging. The Claxson wheat possesses the same good qualities as the Fultz, with the additional advantage of being a red chaff, both white kernel, very large and plump; before cutting and not shattering still at bottom and of medium height, before ripening turn down; matures early as the Mediterranean; not subject to rust, and hardly so far as winter and bad weather have tested it, and because of large heads, having many and large kernels, it is a large yielder, having gone as high as fifty bushels to the acre. As seed of both these varieties can be had at a little advance over the price of common wheat, we advise farmers to try them. -Practical Farmer.
