GENERAL SUMMARY. MONDAY.

A disgusting story of crime and revenge comes from Mount Vernon, Indiana. Last Monday night a party of seven or eight negroes went to a house of ill fame, plundered it and, in the outrage, the three white girls who were inmates.

Russia has brought up the Eastern question again by the claim that the territory between Constantinople and Adrianople is not affected by the Treaty of Berlin.

Attorney General Devens has decided that under the act of June, 1878, the United States Marshal of Arkansas cannot be aided by the troops of the United States as a posse in the execution of his process against the moonshiners in Baxter county, who are up in arms in rebellion against the national government.

The gold premium on Saturday advanced to 101 1/2, ranging from 101 up to that point, with most of the business at 101 1/2. The closing price was 101 1/2.

Gen. McCook has been ordered to take charge of education in the army, and will at once inquire into the progress making in that direction and take steps to put the statutes provided by law into operation.

The First National Bank of Tamaqua, Pa., the failure of which was announced Tuesday, was declared solvent by the bank examiners yesterday, but it is not yet known whether it will resume business or not.

The yellow fever mortality in the South continues diminishing as the fall season advances, though the disease itself is still spreading in the country places.

The United States Supreme Court met at Washington yesterday, and in accordance with custom, the justices paid their respects to a body of the President.

It is established beyond a doubt that the total number of citizens killed near the Nebraska and Kansas State line by the Cheyenne Indians who crossed the Union Pacific railroad October 4 was 43.

The congressional conventions held in New York last night by the regular republicans nominated for Congress, in the eighth district, Anson G. McCook; in the ninth, Wilson Berriman; eleven, Levi P. Morton.

The amount of national bank notes received at the United States treasury at Washington for redemption during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1878, was \$29,190,458; from July 1 to October 14, \$55,263,822.

Secretary Sherman has decided to limit the purchase of silver by the government and to buy on terms, to be received at Washington, for delivery of silver at the Philadelphia mint.

Eight thousand Austrian troops will be withdrawn from Bosnia, and the remainder of the army of occupation reduced to a peace footing.

The mines at Cerro de Pasco, Peru, now being explored, are expected to disclose a bonanza rivaling the Comstock.

Several prominent persons in Peru have been arrested for complicity in revolutionary plots.

The Vatican is taking measures for a very considerable development of Catholicism in America.

Rheims, France, has had a meeting in favor of the Franco-American treaty.

Revolutionary placards are still mysteriously posted in St. Petersburg.

The Paris exposition prize medals are to be distributed October 21.

President Hayes has recognized the independence of Roumania.

The Mexican campaign against the Lipan and Kickapoo Indians, whose raids have been especially annoying to the United States, has ended successfully.

The tribes of the Sierra de Carman and the Sierra de Mesalcedo, the most turbulent of all, are next to be dealt with.

Doug. Goodale returned to his home in Atlantic, Iowa, Monday, from the Black Hills, and was immediately arrested by the military in waiting on the charge of complicity in the Hot Creek (Wyoming) stage robbery.

The box stolen from the First National Bank of Fishkill, Landing, N. Y., by burglars, Wednesday, was found in the woods on the Highlands. The contents, consisting of bonds and mortgages to the value of from \$60,000 to \$100,000 were undisturbed.

Jos. L. Wertz has been convicted at Trenton, N. J., of aiding and abetting Daniel M. Dickenson, clerk in the Manufacturers' Bank of Newark, to embezzle \$10,000. Dickenson pleaded guilty last week. Both will probably be sentenced to jail.

Hon. F. C. Bunnell has withdrawn from the congressional contest in the fifteenth Pennsylvania district. This puts the election of Col. Overton, the regular republican nominee, beyond a doubt.

John McCormack was held in \$1,500 bail in New York yesterday to answer the charge of stealing \$2,000 worth of jewelry from his sisters, two unmarried ladies, living in Irving Place.

Two to three millions in United States bonds have been taken for America in London in the last three days.

The German central socialist committee has dissolved, in view of the certain passage of the anti-socialist bill.

Bishop McQuade, of Rochester, N. Y., was a passenger from New York yesterday, on the Russia, for Liverpool.

David C. Carver, a Brooklyn (N. Y.) politician, committed suicide Tuesday night by taking Pruss green.

A new and less radical basis for an engagement between Church and State in Germany will be adopted.

Differences have arisen between the Russian and English delegates on the Serbian boundary commission.

All possibility of war between Spain and Morocco is now considered removed.

The subjugation of Northern Kraina cost the Austrians 500 men in killed alone.

The New Orleans democrats have nominated Col. Isaac N. Patton for mayor.

The glut of cotton goods in Lancashire is unprececedented.

Hon. Wm. M. Randall died at Pottsville, Pa., yesterday.

Emperor William will resume his throne in December.

The Secretary of the Treasury has issued a schedule in relation to the purchase of silver, in which the purchase of silver by the government is limited to 400,000 fine ounces per week, deliverable in the various mints. The bids are to be for not less than 10,000 ounces each.

The Trinity Episcopal Church, at Princeton, N. J., was partly destroyed by fire yesterday morning. The church had just been opened and furnished at a cost of \$5,000, and was to be opened next Sunday. The fire is supposed to have caught from the flue. Loss \$10,000.

The Orangemen at Montreal have been acquitted of the charge of forming an illegal assembly on the 12th of July last. Judge Rancey charged the jury to acquit, on the ground that assembly in the lodge room was not illegal.

The steamer John Bramall, which for forty-eight days has been lying at New Haven, Ct., with munitions of war for Turkey, will sail to-day. She takes 32,000 rifles, and 32,000 sabres, 21,000,000 balls and shells, all valued at \$679,000.

The fete at the Trocadero Palace of the Paris Exposition for the benefit of the yellow fever sufferers in the United States realized 16,100 francs.

The German socialists, in view of their probable suppression, will infest the meetings of other parties and cause them to dissolve likewise.

CHAPTER 191. AN ACT Prohibiting the Sale of Spirituous or Fermented Liquors in the several counties of the State on the day of Election.

SECTION 1. Be it Enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That it shall not be lawful for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drinking establishment or other place where liquors are sold, or for any person or persons, directly or indirectly, to sell or dispose of any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale or intoxicating drinks of any kind, on the day of election hereafter to be held in the several counties of the State.

SECTION 2. And be it Enacted, That any person violating the provisions of this act shall be liable to indictment by the Grand Jury of the county where the offense is committed, and shall, upon conviction before any Judge of any circuit court of this State, be fined a sum not less than fifty dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars for each and every offense; one-half of the fine to be paid to the informer, and the other half to the county commissioners for the use of public roads.
