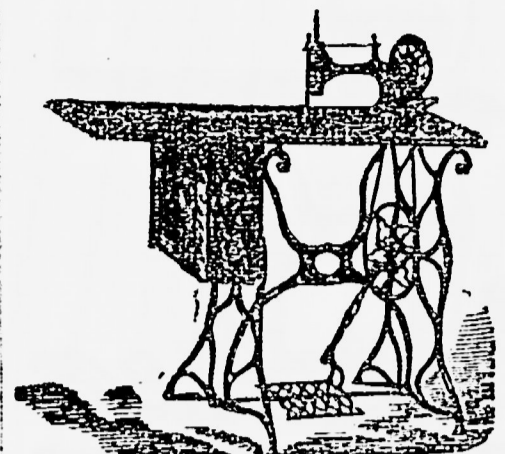

ited, in all of which genuine hospitality
awaited them. At night a good repre-
sentation of the association paid a visit
to Ford's in Baltimore, where they wit-
nessed the play of "Her Majesty's Ship
Pinafore," and the pantomime "Humpty
Dumpty."

The annual treat to the pupils of the
Sunday School at Gray's factory took
place as usual. All present were suit-
ably remembered. Music, vocal and in-
strumental, made up the programme.

Preparations were being made among
Turkeys were dispatched to the

were also delivered by Rev. Mr. Nichole,
the pastor, and Rev. W. J. Floyd, a former
pastor, of Washington.
