

GENERAL SUMMARY. MONDAY.

Chicago operators are in a state of excitement because a number of ticket speculators have obtained large quantities of seats and are selling them for the most extravagant prices. On Wednesday some of these men were demanding from twenty to twenty-five dollars for two seats in the evening, and five dollars each for seats for the afternoon. When the "extra" was discovered, it was found that the seats were on the heads of Mr. Mappleton and Mr. Haverly, his business manager, but these gentlemen are said to be innocent of any part in the speculation. It is charged that some of the speculators in the box office supplied the seats which are held at so high prices. Within the last three days a general train has prevailed throughout California, except in the extreme south, in the northern and central portions enough has fallen to insure fair crops with the usual spring rains. The weather is still unsettled, and there is a prospect of the southern counties being reached by the storm. Edward L. Andrews, attorney for the holders of the old series of Tennessee bonds, has filed bills against eight railroads in Tennessee, upon which they have a lien under the act of 1852. He filed six bills in Memphis, and will file more in Knoxville to-morrow, against railroads upon which the holders of the old bonds have a lien. In the Reno inquiry, at Chicago, Saturday, Captain Moylan testified that it was a wise move for Major Reno to leave the timber when he did during the Little Big Horn fight, otherwise his command would have been annihilated. It is stated in Lansing, Mich., that United States Senator Christy will surely resign and accept the mission to Peru, in which contingency ex-Senator Chandler will be elected to the vacancy. Mrs. Sophia C. Bledsoe, mother of the late Prof. Albert T. Bledsoe, died in Chicago last week, aged 87 years. In the Senate yesterday, General James Shields, the new Senator from Missouri, was sworn in. Mr. White introduced a bill authorizing the retirement of Colonel Wm. H. French, of the Fourth Artillery, with the rank of brigadier general. The bill to pay Warren Mitchell \$128,492, the proceeds of cotton captured at Savannah, Ga., was debated at length, meeting with great opposition. Mr. Edmunds moved to postpone the bill and take up his resolutions in relation to the constitutional amendments, but a motion for an executive session was agreed to. In the House Mr. Wright's \$360 poor man's bill was taken up and a vote was finally taken, it received only 22 in the affirmative to 212 in the negative. A bill was considered providing for the erection of court houses, custom houses and post-offices at various points. Mr. Mills objected because there was no appropriation for Texas, and on his motion the House adjourned. Memorials from Philadelphia were presented, the discriminating sugar duties, and favoring the ad valorem principle. In the executive session of the Senate yesterday, Mr. Conkling reported adversely on the nomination of Edwin A. Merritt for collector of the port of New York. The replies of General Arthur and Mr. Cornell to the charges of mismanagement of the New York custom house while under their charge were read, and endorsed to be printed. The will of Caleb Cushing gives no statement of property and makes no bequest. The will was made in Madrid in 1876. The property is to be divided equally between the five children of John N. and three children of the late Wm. Cushing. John N. Cushing is the executor. A fire at the Williamstown, Pa., colliery has destroyed the engines and drum at the top of the slope, and caused the suffocation of about twenty men. The damage is estimated at from twenty to fifty thousand dollars. The measures taken by Russia to prevent the spread of the plague appear to be efficacious, but reports prevail that cases have occurred near Moscow; the town of Tsarsitsin is isolated by a cordon of troops. Dr. Linderman, the Director of the United States Mine, died at Washington yesterday afternoon. He has occupied the post since 1873. Italy is taking steps to prevent the introduction of the plague, and the inspection and fumigation of vessels from South Italian ports. The British gun-boat Gaslow has returned from a successful cruise for anti-pastel steamer that was reported off Fao. The report that Sitting Bull had crossed the Canadian line is confirmed, and a large gathering of hostiles is likely to take place. The United States Supreme Court will take a recess on Monday next until the first Monday in March. The proposed purchase of Cyprus by England is contradicted. WEDNESDAY. In the United States Senate, yesterday, a memorial was presented, signed by 3,190 persons, representing sixteen States, favoring the establishment of a bureau to collect statistics in regard to labor interests, and for an inquiry as to what extent machinery has taken the place of manual labor. The bill to pay Warren Mitchell \$128,000 for cotton taken from him by the government during the war, at Savannah, Ga., was defeated by a vote of 17 to 30, ten Democrats, including Messrs. Dennis, of Maryland, and Bayard, of Delaware, voting against it, and four Republicans voting for the bill. Senator White did not vote, being paired. Mr. Edmunds moved to take up his resolutions declaring the validity of the thirteenth, fourteenth and fifteenth constitutional amendments. The motion was carried by a vote of 29 to 16. Messrs. Bayard, Harris, Kernan, McPherson, Morgan and Hill, Democrats, voting with the Republicans in the affirmative. The Senate then adjourned. In the House the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill, which appropriates \$15,155,565 was reported. The bill to restrict the immigration of Chinese was debated at length and finally passed—yeas 155, nays 73. The postoffice appropriation bill was further considered, and several amendments, increasing the appropriation in the aggregate \$335,000, were adopted. A joint resolution was passed calling on the Secretary of State for a detailed statement of expenditures made by the government at the Paris exposition. The Teller congressional committee on election frauds examined several more colored reports on witnesses at Charleston, S. C., yesterday. Cases of intimidation and ballot frauds were mentioned. White and colored democratic witnesses testified to contrary circumstances, showing that every opportunity was given to the republican witness to vote, and that some of the republican witness could not be believed on oath. Receipts of grain into the several Baltimore elevators on Monday aggregated 311,000 bushels, one of the best days' work ever done by them. Of this 124,300 bushels was wheat and 187,600 bushels corn. The figures include the arrivals by railroads on both Sunday and Monday, together with such as remained previously on the track. The total represents about 700 carloads of grain. The sub-committee of the House judiciary committee to investigate the charges against Judge Henry W. Blodgett, of the United States District Court at Chicago, arrived in that city yesterday morning, and spent the day in determining upon the details of the methods of procedure. The committee consists of Representatives Knott, Culberson and Liphman. The ice harvest on the Hudson river this season is the most successful ever known, the quantity secured being greater and the quality better. The gathering will be finished this week, and it is expected 3,000,000 tons will be obtained, which, it is supposed, will suffice for a two years' crop, a thing that has never happened before. In the billiard tournament at New York yesterday between Heiser and Gallaher, Heiser won by a score of 609 to 446. In the next game Schaefer beat Dwyer 1000 to 65. Schaefer closed the game with a run of 311, but the excited audience insisted on his playing, and he continued until he scored 118, the largest run ever made in public. At the Peabody concert, on Saturday last, Miss Bask sang a German air, with variations, by Malibran. She sang the highest note, A flat on the fourth line above the lines. This, it is claimed, is the highest note that has been sung by any living singer, either in Europe or America. THURSDAY. In the United States Senate, yesterday, bills were passed granting a pension of \$50 a month to the widow of Rear Admiral Paulding; increasing the pension of Dr. Mary Walker to \$20 a month, and granting a pension of \$50 a month to the widow of Gen. Robt. Anderson. A bill for promoting the efficiency of chaplains in the army was passed. The unfinished business being Mr. Edmunds' resolutions in regard to the thirteenth, fourteenth and fifteenth amendments to the constitution of the United States, was laid before the Senate by the Vice-President, but Mr. Morgan, who had offered the substitute agreed on the democratic caucus, not claiming the floor, the Senate voted to go into executive session, and afterwards adjourned. The House spent the session in considering the postoffice appropriation bill, and a number of amendments increasing the appropriation were agreed to. An evening session was held for the consideration of reports from the committee on commerce. Much excitement exists in Winchester, Ind., over a fight which occurred Tuesday between J. M. Carver, teacher of the public school, and several male scholars. Carver was whipping a small boy, when several large boys assaulted him with clubs, some of them drawing knives. The boys were expelled by the superintendent, but were immediately reinstated by the school board, whereupon Butler and Carver tendered their resignations. There was a meeting of the county commissioners of Prince George's county, Wednesday last to consult with the State tax commissioner, Hon. Levin Woolford, who was present at the meeting, in regard to the assessment to be placed upon bank stocks, etc., held by persons living in the county. Mr. Woolford learns that a considerable amount of assessable stock, etc., was found and placed upon the assessment books. Gen. Sherman and party arrived at Atlanta yesterday, it being his first visit to that city since the war. Several thousand people were congregated at the depot. The weather was fine, and the entire party walked to the hotel, Gen. Sherman going arm-in-arm with Gen. Angur. The party last night attended a ball given in their honor at McPherson barracks. Carbonic acid in extremely feeble doses arrests vegetation at once, but if this substance is removed, by evaporation or otherwise, the physiological functions are again revived. On the other hand, salicylic acid and allylsalicylic acid, in small quantities, retard the growth. The author finds that this effect is not attended by any apparent alteration.

Thrown from the Train. As the Richmond Express (coming south) stopped at Prince-ton Junction at 3:30 o'clock on Saturday afternoon the young men—Benjamin M. Vaughan, William Vaughan and a friend, all members of the junior class of Princeton College—stepped aboard and seated themselves in one of the Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore Railroad cars at the rear of the train. The two Vaughans, with their companion, were on their way to Wilmington, Delaware, to spend Sunday with their parents, expecting to return on Monday morning. They remained in the car until the train had passed Philadelphia, when one of them proposed a walk through the cars. The others consented, and all went to the door. The train was then near a station, and the two Vaughans, with their companion, stepped out, and were thrown from the train by the force of the wind blowing fiercely from the northwest and as the first young man stepped upon the platform the wind caught his hat, whirling it away in two or three circles, and he, escaping being blown from the car, grasping the brake wheel he managed to pass to the next car, and turned to warn his companions. The next student who emerged from the front car was Benjamin Vaughan. He had hardly stepped upon the platform when the wind, increasing in fury, tore open his overcoat, and flung him from his feet back into the car, with terrific force over on the Delaware river side of the track. His brother and friend beheld his frantic endeavors to grasp the railing, and heard his despairing cry as he was swept into the night and eternity. The alarm was given at once, and the greatest consternation prevailed for a time on the train. It was some minutes afterward, and a distance of four miles had been traversed before the conductor was informed of the accident. Many persons requested him to stop the train, but mindful of the lives entrusted to his care, and the danger of such action, he proceeded to make a safer plan of running to the station at Philadelphia, and telegraphing the particulars asking that a hand-car be sent to look for the missing man. At Wilmington William Vaughan and his friend telegraphed to Linwood, and by 7 o'clock word was received that the body of young Vaughan had been found near the spot where he had been blown from the platform. It lay to the westward with which the train was going, and the level stretch Vaughan's death must have been instantaneous. Benjamin M. Vaughan was the son of Dr. Vaughan, a prominent physician of Wilmington. He was about twenty-four years of age, and a member of the junior class, scientific department, Princeton College. He was tall and of rather slender build. In his class he was a favorite, and made many friends outside of it by his good natured and pleasant manners. He was a member of the class base ball nine and a prominent athlete. Young Vaughan was well known in Baltimore, having paid several visits recently, and the news of his sad death will be received with sorrow.—American.

What is Castile Soap? A Subscriber wishes to know how this differs from other soaps. The hard soap made in this country are almost exclusively from animal fats; in the south of Europe, where the olive grows abundantly, the poorer kinds of olive oil are used for soap making. Common soaps are soda and animal fat. Castile soap is soda and vegetable oil. In making Castile soap, great care is taken to avoid an excess of alkali (the soda) only just enough being used to neutralize the oil. On this account the soap is much milder, and may be used on wounds and other surfaces where common soap would irritate and give pain. The mottled appearance of Castile soap is due to a small quantity of solution of copras (sulphate of iron) which is added just before it hardens; this leaves a bluish oxide of iron in the soap which when exposed to air, becomes changed to the red-oxide. White Castile soap is also sold, which is the same as the other without the coloring. Though called Castile it is by no means exclusively made in Spain, the largest share coming from France, from the south of France, and indeed it is generally known in Europe as Marseilles soap.—American Agriculturist for February.
