> AMERICAN WHEAT IN SPAIN. - The first cargo of American wheat was landed in Barcelona, Spain, about November 15, and created quite a sensition among the dealers. Previously most of the wheat handled at that market has been Black Sea and Hungarian, but the American was judged to be equal to the best grades of those varieties, and this cargo has called for about 25 cargoes more. The amount of the shipment was 72,000 bushels, the price obtained \$3.70 per 120 lbs, and the cost of the freight was \$18,000. The only unwelcome feature of this item of news is that the grain was carried in a British steamer, and that the cargoes further bargained for are to be carried in British vessels.
