Messus, Editors : Feeling a great interest in modern education and aware of the dangers which threaten its wellfare,I will briefly state my idea of technical education, which I consider the chief one, to which it is exposed. It is a fact, notorious as it is true to the principles of human nature, that a technical education is the very worst on which to ground hopes of those splendid improvements which have an effect, so stupendous upon the destinies of

Centuries may roll away in incessant toil to obtain some great secret, and the efforts and labor of man prove vain, but when the Deity thinks proper to say, "Let there be light," there is light, and no: before, and that light is generally produced in the very opposite quarter from which it was expected. Let us look back, let us contemplate the registered events which have gradually lifted society from barbarism to our present state of refinement, and we shall perceive the truth of the above, by finding that almost all discoveries of importance, all brilliant productions of genius have nearly always been the offspring of those not possessed of that technical education, which at first sight, might reasonably be supposed to have originated them.

These remarks have the character of universality. We are not indebted for the best poems, the best plays, the best works of fiction, to those whose lives have been one of continued education.

Universities and colleges, as a body, have given fewer people of literary renown than any other class of men. Milton owed but little to them; Pope less; the immortal Shakespeare absolutely nothing.

The first idea of a steam-engine originated not with a professed machinist, but in a reflective nobleman; the logarithms were discovered, not by the Professor of a college, but by Baron Napier; the spinning-jeony was the invention of a barber. Every department of science has gained more from those who have not been trammeled by technicalities, although

they have been guided by general laws, and why? 


