WEDNESDAY.

In the United States Senate, vesterday, a bill was passed appropriating \$200,000 for the construction of a steel vessel to be used in the disinfection of vessels and cargoes coming from ports supposed to be infected with yellow fever or other contagious diseases.

In the House the legislative appropriation bill was reported, with an amendment forbid-ding the employment of chief supervisors of elections and special or deputy marshals of elections. The army appropriation bill was then taken up, and the amendment prohibiting the use of troops at the polls led to a long debate, which was participated in by Mesers. Chalmers, Hurd and Muldrow, demograts, and Belford, Humpurey and Frye, republicans. During March the United States mint at

In the House, it was ordered that general debate on the army appropriation bill should close at three o'clock to-morrow afternoon, after which the debate shall be limited to live minute speeches. Debate on the bill was then resumed, and a number of speeches were delivered, the principle ones being by Mr. Williams, republican, of Wisconsin, and Mr. Townshend, democrat, of Illinois. The former defended the use of the bayonet, and contended that the President had the right to rend troops to the polls or into "the hurch of Mr. Townshend criticised Mr. Garfield's late speech, and said if that gentleman wanted to find a revolutionist, he would point to John Sherman, the revolutionist of 1867, when general legislation had been placed upon the civil sundry appropriation bill.

FRIDAY.

In the United States Senate, yesterday, the session was spent in discussing the right of Mr. Chales it. Bell to a seat in the Senate from the Governor. The Senate then adjourned until Monday next.
