Some years since the Messrs. purchased extensive tracts of timbe ia, near the thriving town of Suffolk, this land, somewhere in the neighborho 20,000 acres, they constructed a railroa equipped it with all necessary engines and roll-FRESH BREAD, MARYLAND BISCUITS, ing stock, and creeted a number of sawmills at convenient distances. Here, in the heart of the primeval wilderness, binding on the great Dismal Swamp, they commenced the manufacture of lumber from trees among which the vell of the aborigine had resounded, and where the keen edge of the destroying axe had never pene-

trated. As the lumber was made from trees that are technically known as "first growth," it readily found rapid sale in the markets of the Atlantic cities, and the work of extending the railroad went forward and the mills and workmen multiplied correspondingly. They have now com-pleted about fourteen miles of railroad, hav-ing fine terminal facilities on the Nansemond (Graduate of Baltimore College of Dental river, where the "fruit" of the mills is shipped to the many destinations which the ramified interests of the concern demand. Of course, the business at this point requires the employ-ment of a small army of men as wood-choppers, reilroad and mill hands, teamsters, et cetera. The mills have capacity for producing about 50,000 feet of lumber, or bill stuff,

daily, and 15,000,000 annually. The railroad is provided with carrying means of 100,000 feet of lumber per diem. In addition to the vast quantities of lumber manufactured here they also cut something like twelve or fifteen thousand cords of wood annually, which is principally disposed of in New York, where MUTUAL FIRE INSURANCE COMPANY market price. A fleet of vessels belonging to the firm is engaged in transporting the wood and lumber brought down to the Nansemond to all the Atlantic cities and the cities of the District of Columbia. Just here it may be well to remark that the lumber produced at this place is considered as tine yellow pine as can

be had in the market.
At Salisbury, Md., where the headquarters of the firm are located, they have extensive lumber yards in which are stored vast piles of lumber, the products of the mills in the surrounding country and of their place at Suffoik, ready for manufacture or shipment to any point that may be demanded. The firm has also at this point a very large mill for dressing lumber and manufacturing box material, and numerous other forms in which pine lumber is required by the exigencies of commerce. The mill is one of the most complete concerns in the State and the material turned out there enjoys a fine

reputation for quality and finish.

Messrs, E. E. Jackson & Co. have recently opened a branch house in Baltimore to accommodate the growing demand here for their goods, with W. F. Jackson, the junior partner, as manager. Their office is located at No. 18 West Falls Avenue, where they have also extensive yards for the storage of all kinds of lumber, dressed and undressed. They have also a box factory at No. 103 McElderry's wharf, for the manufacture of all kinds of boxes used by oyster and fruit packers, &c., in which a large number of workmen are employed during the

cason when boxes are in demand.

From the foregoing it may be surmised that this firm employ a very large number of people in Suffolk, Salisbury and Baltimore. They probably have on their pay-rolls nearly five hundred men in all, which will compare favorably with that of any employers in the State. The points of excellence which they claim for

In the heat of the battle she maintained a position near the gunners, flourishing a saber, and in-spiring the men to deeds of valor, when she was, at last, hurled to the deck by the wind of a plassing shot which killed two men near by. Garibaldi sprang to her, believing that he would find her a corpse, when she arose to her feet, covered with the blood of the men who had fallen at her side, but quite unhurt. Gari-baldi begged her to go below and remain until the action was over. "I will go," was her re-ply, "but only to drive out the sneaking cow-ards who are skulking there!" for a moment before she had seen two or three men desert their posts for a place of safely. And, going below, she immediately reappeared, driving before her the men filled with shame at being thus forced to duty by a resolute woman. > A Wonderful Wall, Another curiosity has been unearthened in Virginia to add to the many inducements for attracting strangers.
