**GENERAL SUMMARY.**

Petroleum fell Saturday in New York to the lowest prices ever known since the discovery of the oil, the market declining to 61½ cents per barrel for the crude product. The highest price ever paid was \$20 per barrel in January, 1860. The average price last year was \$11.37; in 1870, \$2.88; and in 1875, \$2.73 per barrel. The decline is due to the present production, which reaches no less than 51,000 barrels per day. Refined oil is now worth only 1½ cents per gallon.

The ceremony of unveiling the memorial to Bayard Taylor, presented to Cornell University by the graduating class, took place at Sage Chapel Monday afternoon. The memorial consists of a fine gray marble slab, the upper half of which is fluted with an accurate medallion of the lamented poet, while the lower half contains the following inscription: "Lecturer on German Literature," together with the dates of birth and death.

There are 9,000,000 pairs of corsets made in the United States annually, which may be taken as some evidence of how much squeezing the women can stand before they scream.

A little son of Edward Fordham died in Montreal on Friday from eating diseased pork. Mr. Fordham, his wife and second child suffered from the same cause, but are recovering.

The Senate Judiciary sub committee, consisting of Senators Bayard, Conkling, Carpenter and Garland, who have under consideration the nomination of Attorney General McCrary as successor to Judge Dillon, find the obstacles to his confirmation while holding his present office, and while Judge Dillon still holds his seat, insuperable. He will probably be nominated when Judge Dillon's resignation takes effect in September, and be confirmed in December.

The House Election Committee reported on the Iowa election cases Monday. Eleven members hold that the October election was legal, and that the present incumbents are entitled to their seats. Chairman Springer takes the ground that neither the October nor the November election was legal, and Representative Colerick holds that the November election was the only legal one.

The House labor committee have agreed to visit San Francisco and leading Western cities after adjournment for the purpose of taking further testimony. Eastern cities are also to be visited on their return. No action will be taken by the Senate on the nomination of D. T. Corbin, of South Carolina, as Chief Justice of Utah until December.

In the United States Senate, Tuesday, a bill was passed in regard to the enrollment and licensing ships or vessels in the coasting trade. The remainder of the session was devoted to the army appropriation bill.

In the House Senate amendments to the legislative appropriation bill was concurred in. The bill prohibiting political assessments being called up, Mr. McLean

In the United States Senate, Wednesday, a bill was passed to relieve the churches of the District of Columbia and clear the title of trustees to such property. House bill to appoint a Mississippi river improvement commission was taken up and passed. The army appropriation bill was called up by Mr. Withers, who indicated his purpose to press it to a vote, which was resisted by Mr. Conkling and others, who desired to debate it. The republicans were filibustering until a late hour this morning.

In the House the morning hour was consumed in the consideration of the bill prohibiting political assessments. The "judicial expenses" bill was reported from the appropriation committee, and all the Senate amendments but one concurred in. Senate amendments to the legislative appropriation bill were concurred in. The remainder of the session was spent in debate on a bill reported by Mr. Stephens, of Ga., for exchanging trade dollars for legal-tender dollars.

The Governor of Minnesota was summoned at midnight Tuesday night to Tracy's mines, at the terminus of the Hastings and Dakota railroad, to suppress a riot. A number of telegrams received by the Governor from Tracy state that three hundred laborers and tramps are in town making riotous demonstrations, and the officials are trying to restore order. There seems to have been no violence or blood shed thus far.

The New Hampshire Legislature Wednesday elected State officers, as follows: A. B. Thompson, of Concord, secretary of State; Solon A. Carter, of Keene, State treasurer; John B. Clark, of Manchester, State printer. The election of United States Senator was completed by the two houses in convention, Henry W. Blair being declared chosen.

In the United States Senate, at three o'clock Thursday afternoon, the filibustering on the part of the republicans against the army appropriation bill, which was begun on Wednesday, came to an end. At that hour, after being in session 27 hours, Mr. Carpenter, on the part of the republicans, proposed an adjournment until Friday for rest and sleep, assuring the democrats that his side would agree to come to a vote on the bill Friday. This proposition was accepted by the democrats, and the Senate adjourned.

In the House the conference report upon the judicial appropriation bill was submitted, and after a spirited debate, in which Messrs. Garfield and McMahon were the leading speakers, it was agreed to by a vote of 102 to 70—a strict party vote. The House then took up and passed without division the bill to provide for the exchange of trade dollars for legal-tender silver dollars.

**On the Application of Bone Dust.**

The quantity of bone or phosphate to the land intended for wheat will depend not only upon the condition of the soil, but on that of the fertilizer also. In some sections of our State, and those too, where the land has been highly improved, principally by the application of bone dust, there are some farmers who apply as much as a thousand pounds to the acre. This, of course, supersedes the necessity of more frequent applications, but we have ever considered it as of very doubtful economy, and can only be indulged in by those who have a plowshare purse. There is a loss at least of the interest of more than one half of the money thus invested as under no circumstances is it deemed necessary, even upon the most exhausted soil to which it may be applied, if a due regard is paid to a liberal addition of the organic manure in connection therewith, for an application of more than five hundred pounds of bone ash to the acre, provided, however, that the raw bone or the best class of phosphates are finely ground and evenly applied. If the land is in only fair condition 250 to 300 pounds will be a fair dose; if it is so poor or exhausted that there is danger of not getting a good catch of grass, then apply 300 to 400 or 450 pounds to the acre. If, however, the land is in good condition, 150 to 250 will give good results, as we have uniformly found in our applications. The bone should be drilled in with the seed, and the best results on the first crop will be obtained in this way but for the more general improvement of the land, and to secure better results to the grass crop, an additional quantity sown broadcast will amply repay the amount expended. If the bone is coarse, or the phosphate poor (and there is a very great difference in the quality), then larger amounts should be used to obtain the same results.—Baltimore American.
