Bent in Liquor. For the information of all persons concerned the following Act of the Legislature, pursed March 24th, 1865, is published: CHAPTER 191.

AN ACT Prohibiting the Sale of Spirituous or Fermented Liquors in the several counties of the State, on the day of Election.

SECTION 1. Le it enacted by the General Assembly of Margland, That it shall not be lawfur for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drinking establishment or other place where liquors are sold, or for any person or where righters are sold, or for any person or persons, directly or indirectly, to sell, Barter, give or dispose of any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale or beer, or intoxicating drinks of any kind, on the day of election hereafter to be held in the several counties of the State.


